Goodbye Maurice

January 16, 2016 sadly marked the passing of Maurice Star at 97 years of age. Born on June 21, 1918, the second child of Frederick and Beatrice Star of Bungil. He was born along with his five brothers and sister at his maternal grandparents' home at Cudgewa, delivered into the world by his grandmother and local bush midwife Jane Land.

His schooling until the eighth grade was at the old Bungil Primary School and on leaving, helping his father and brothers on the farm. One of the great family traditions was growing of watermelons. Maurice recalled that they got a tip off that the patch was to be raided by some of the locals from Granya. Just on dark after waiting in hiding for hours for the culprits to arrive, an impatient and probably hungry Maurice discharged his shotgun into a distant willow tree and to his surprise the potential melon thieves fell out of the tree, cursing Maurice as they ran back to Granya.

In his early days trips to Albury were rare and to visit



his Star grandparents who had retired to Albury and lived on the corner of David and Swift Streets. One of the few memories of his grandmother Star was of an elegant woman in a long flowing black dress hurriedly heading off to church at St David's with several of her cronies close at her heels.

Of his early days Maurice had many stories of fighting bushfires particularly in 1939 and 1952. One story from 1952 was of having to drive a severely burnt Jack Sutherland over a burning Granya Gap to Tallangatta Hospital. On arrival he was amazed at the speed and skill of the attending nurse. That nurse was later to become Mrs Mary Wood of Talgarno.

Maurice never spoke much about the hardships of the Depression years but said that they always ate well and rarely ate rabbit. The Depression finished with a drought and a war. Agistment for starving cattle was available in the Hunter Valley to which transport was by rail and with precedence given to the soldiers, a seat for visits to check cattle and return home was often difficult and at times on an empty five gallon drum or the toilet seat the only options.

Due to a birth defect that left Maurice with a section of bone missing from his forehead, he could not pursue the football and cricket glory of his brothers. Instead he became very successful as a sprinter at many of the local sports meetings. One of his more humbling moments was being narrowly beaten by a youngster from Walwa. That youngster was Lance Mann who went on to win a Stawell Gift and play 80 games for Essendon.

In 1939 along with his father and brother Arthur, they formed, with the purchase of Bungil Station the partnership known as F J Star and Sons. His brothers Jim, Tom, and Don formally came into the partnership in 1951. The partnership was successful over a long period of years at topping both cattle and wool markets. Their superfine merino wool frequently

topped the Albury wool sales held at the wool exchange which fronted Dean Street in what is now the Commercial Club. Angus bullocks held pride of place in the enterprise and for many years were sold at the Newmarket saleyards in Melbourne. The majority of times Maurice would travel to the city in the guards van on the train with his beloved livestock. One highlight was that on arriving at Newmarket he found his cattle painted and numbered. After berating his agent for defiling his cattle in such a way he was informed that it was the first live weight sale. Anger turned to joy when he topped the market. The joy continued when two prominent Upper Murray Hereford breeders were heard muttering that these stumpy legged, pod gutted black angus weighed a lot heavier than they looked. Live weight sales along with the promotion of Breed Plan had become the start of the Angus Revolution.

In the early 1950's while watching his brothers play cricket at Bethanga he met a local lass by the name of Josephine Rowley; impressed by this charming gentleman from the wilds of the barbarous Granya region, her parents invited him home for the evening meal. They married on April 30, 1960 and commenced their married life at Helston Park Talgarno; the property bought by the family partnership a few years earlier.

Maurice's opinion of Talgarno during his early days of living there was that it was inhabited by several families that he best described as 'gentleman farmers.' When the electricity was to be turned on at Talgarno there was a shortfall of a thousand pounds that was due through community contributions and guaranteed to be paid back by the State Electrical Commission over a period of time. It was left to Maurice and John Condon (both relative newcomers to Talgarno) to make up the payment and for many years Maurice cursed the so called

'gentleman farmers' as they had mains power going past their front doors while he had a private line that he eventually had to replace, despite making up the shortfall they couldn't afford.

In April 1961 Maurice and Josie were blessed with the arrival of their only child Peter. In the years to follow Maurice involved himself with the many organisations, groups and clubs that his wife and son held an interest in. He was a long serving member of the CFA at both Granya and Talgarno and the handicapper and starter of the footraces at the Bethanga and Wymah Gymkhanas.

Peter married Diane in 1990 and they presented him with two grandchildren, Alex (1993) and Georgia (1998).

Until April last year, Maurice was still living independently at home. Josie had succumbed to severe arthritis and was residing at Lutheran Aged Care in Albury. A bad fall also forced Maurice to live at Lutheran and the recovery from bowel surgery soon after put his overall health into a downward spiral. He passed away peacefully with Josie at his side.

Sadly missed, never to be forgotten.

The family is grateful for the kind and compassionate care provided by the fantastic staff of Lutheran Aged Care. A kind thankyou to Dr David Oliver and the staff of the Albury Central Medical Clinic. Maurice's visits over the years were more entertaining than medicinal. A heartfelt thank you to Anthea Redman for her kind and loving friendship to both Maurice and Josie over the past years. Tallangatta Health Service must be thanked for the great support provided to Maurice and Josie while they were living at home and not to be forgotten is the great service provided by Berringa CERT.

Craniosynostosis is defined by Wikipedia 'as a condition in which one or more of the fibrous sutures (joints) in an infant skull prematurely fuses by turning into bone (ossification), thereby changing the growth pattern of the skull.

Because the skull cannot expand perpendicular to the fused suture, it compensates by growing more in the direction parallel to the closed sutures. Sometimes the resulting growth pattern provides the

necessary space for the growing brain, but results in an <u>abnormal</u> <u>head shape and abnormal facial features.</u>

Craniosynostosis occurs in one in 2000 births. Surgery has helped many young infants to go on and lead a normal life. "

Mass/Group Plantings!!!

I've been observing several gardens in and around Albury/Wodonga that have stuck to only a few varieties of plant, but then planted them on mass. I personally like a diverse garden with a few more varieties (or heaps), but in saying that I have been dabbling in some group plantings at home and am loving the look..

Most of us out this way have slightly larger or much larger blocks so we can afford to use more varieties if that's what you're looking for.

Always looking at water and soil issues, I've found a few varieties that I am loving and feel they give you the biggest bang for your buck. I've spoken about some of these plants before, for their colour or hardiness, but now we are on the mass planting band wagon.

Some of my mass planting varieties – only going to get better with time

- Alstroemeria small flowering plant (brilliant colours, drought and frost hardy, excellent cut flower.)
- Canna Lilies small to tall flowering plant (great colours, drought and frost hardy-mostly)
- Crepe Myrtle small to medium tree (fabulous colours, drought and frost hardy)
- Any of the upright *Pyrus* (ornamental pear) varieties including *Pyrus Capital*.
- Buddleia small to medium tree (fabulous colours, drought and frost hardy, brings in amazing amount of insects)
- Irises look fabulous en-mass

- Sedum varieties also look wonderful mass planted, they are tough, flowers for a very long time.
- For edging garden beds, tough herbs like
 Oregano or Marjoram are wonderful mass
 planted. My Oregano had 9 different species of
 insects on it yesterday; it was a magnet to all
 sorts of critters.

Vines and climbers

I've also been planting some plants to use as screens or walls in the garden using trellises or old gates to grow them up.

If you have a large space or wall to fill you can't go past the very hardy deciduous Ornamental Grape, they give the lushest Mediterranean look to your garden in the hottest part of summer, and do it very quickly. They do grow like triffids, so careful where you plant them or be aware you will need to give them a bit of a trim in the growing season.

If you are looking for evergreen vines, some of our native *Pandoreas* are just fantastic.

New Vets In Tallangatta

After 25 years, the Tallangatta and Kiewa Veterinary Clinics have changed ownership. As of January 1st this year, Joe and Meika Skuse have bought the business and are continuing to service the North-East valleys and townships.

Joe and Meika moved to Tallangatta in early 2015 in pursuit of a job opportunity, which has progressed, into business ownership. The husband and wife team moved here from North-West NSW districts, after several years of work around the areas of Narrabri, Wee Waa and Coonamble, and a brief stint around Finley and Jerilderie in the southern Riverina. Their work background in mixed practices in those districts brings to the area experience in cattle, horses and companion animals. Joe particularly enjoys the on-property work with livestock and horses, and so you will more commonly see him out on the road. Mixed practice is Meika's preference- a bit of everything!

Meika grew up on her family farm, north of Goulburn, NSW, which is still been run by her parents. 
Prospects for the Season Ahead

Rainfall Round-up

The summer rainfall (November to end January) was 213 mm, 43% above the average (149 mm). Both November (94 mm) and January (89 mm) were wetter than average while December was a little drier than average. Much of the heavier rainfall in November and January came from thunderstorms that are largely unpredictable.



The Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) outlook suggested that we had only one chance in 3 for better than average rain and in turned out we got that outcome! The major driver of the better than average rainfall seems to have been the warmth in the Indian Ocean that created the moisture that allowed the storm rains in southern Australia triggered by passing cold fronts.


For the year as a whole our rainfall was close to average with January, April, August and November wetter than normal and March, September and October drier.

Prospects for Autumn (February to end April)

The El Niño is now weakening but there is no agreement about when it will finish nor whether it will be followed by a La Niña or a neutral SOI. At this time of the year the SOI gives very little guidance about the season ahead so the modellers rely on other indicators. The good news is that 9 out of 11 models suggest that we will get average rainfall and the remaining 2 suggest slightly wetter than normal. Looking even further forward to winter the news is even better with 6 out of 8 models suggesting wetter than normal and the remaining 2 suggesting average rainfall.

The graph below shows the soil moisture level (in the root zone) for our district over 2015 expressed

as a percentage of maximum soil moisture. (The effects of the dry September and October are very evident. (www.bom.gov.au/water/landscape/)



At present our soil moisture is about 10%, slightly above average for this time of year. This good soil moisture level and encouraging seasonal outlooks suggest the chances are we **MAY** have a better than average year.

Anybody interested in watching an entertaining and helpful presentation on climate forecasting and how it can be used might want to try a Youtube clip entitled What are the 'odds' of a boom or bust spring – Graeme Anderson. Also, because climate outlooks can change quickly, I recommend that you keep up to date with Dale Grey's Fast Break newsletter. The Message is Simple – Don't Leave Kids in Cars

It is illegal to leave a child unattended in a vehicle, in all states and territories of Australia

Between 1st September 2013 and 31st August 2014, Ambulance Victoria paramedics rescued 1,165 children who had been left unattended in a car. Figures from Ambulance Victoria reveal that:

- Two thirds of call outs for children locked in cars were to car parks, streets or public places
- The summer months (December 2013 March 2014) were the busiest period with an average of four call outs to a child left unattended in a car per day
- 42% of incidents occurred between 11am and 3pm

Children are particularly at risk because they can lose fluid quickly, become dehydrated and suffer from heatstroke that is life threatening.

In Victoria, it is illegal to leave a child unattended in a vehicle under the Children, Youth and Families Act (2005). The penalties for leaving a child unattended in a car in Victoria include:

- A fine (currently \$3,690), or
- A maximum of six months jail

Do not leave your child or pet in a vehicle alone

Energy efficient LED street lighting on the way for Towong Shire

Towong Shire Council will upgrade more than 300 street lights across the Shire from 9 February 2016 to energy efficient LED street lighting as part of the Watts Working Better project.

Council is pleased to join the Watts Working Better project as a collaborative partner with other Victorian Councils. Towong Shire Council Mayor, Cr David Wortmann said 'the project is expected to produce significant savings for Council through reduced electricity and maintenance costs'. He said street lighting represents the single largest source of greenhouse gas emissions and a large portion of utility costs for most Councils.

The new lights will consume up to 77% less power than those currently in place reducing greenhouse gas emission by more than 106,700 tonnes over the next 20 years.

Cr David Wortmann said 'There is unlikely to be any inconvenience to residents or businesses throughout the upgrade process.' No disruption to electricity supplies will occur as a result of the installation.

Cr Wortmann also said the results of the survey also fulfil a number of mandatory reporting requirements under the Victorian Government's Local Government Performance Reporting Framework.

Domestic Animal Management Plan

Under the Domestic Animal Act 1994 all Victorian councils are required to prepare a Domestic Animal Management Plan. Council resolved to adopt the draft Domestic Animal Management Plan it has had on public exhibition.

The primary focus of the Plan is the management of companion animals, namely dogs and cats. Council acknowledges the role it plays in promoting responsible pet ownership and enforcing the legislation but everyone needs to be aware of their responsibilities.

If you love your pets, you need to do the right thing and not let your dogs roam unaccompanied outside your property and cats should be inside between the hours of 9.30pm and 6.00am, seven days a week. Council has introduced a cat curfew and cat owners are reminded that it is an offence if cats are

WHAT HAPPENED AT THE COUNCIL MEETING IN FEBRUARY?

A summary of issues considered at the Council meeting held on 2 February 2016 in Corryong is provided below:

Netball Courts Funding Application – Two clubs have expressed an interest in having their projects submitted in the 2016/17 Country Football Netball Program. The program is provided by Sport and Recreation Victoria who facilitate the Country Football Netball Program to provide funding for football and netball facilities throughout Victoria.

With the 2016/17 funding round closing on 11 February 2016 Council resolved to submit the application made by Rowen Park Committee of Management (for the Tallangatta Netball Club). If successful a grant of \$38,900 would be made to the club to install one new netball court at the Sports Complex.

Council then resolved to list the Mitta United application (for two netball courts at Eskdale) as its next priority when funding becomes available again.

Tallangatta Integrated Community Centre (TICC) - In March 2016 Council will open the Tallangatta Early Years Learning Centre in the newly constructed Tallangatta Integrated Community Centre. The service will offer Long Day Care, After School Care and a funded Kindergarten program.

Previously Council was considering having this service delivered by an external organisation, but has now resolved to provide the service 'in-house'. A further budget allocation is now required to furnish the early years centre and Council resolved to allocate \$35,000. This will enable the establishment of a quality learning environment for young children using the services in the TICC. These services will strengthen our community and contribute to making Towong Shire the ideal place to live.

Town Maintenance Contracts – Council recently sought tenders for the Town Maintenance contracts. Council will discuss this item at the 1 March 2016 Ordinary meeting.

Shocked

We were recently called to a case where a 6 year old was electrocuted when she touched the pole of an ornamental light in the garden. The 240 volts threw her to the ground but her foot was still in contact with the pole. Her teenage cousin received a shock when she attempted to move the victim by her arms. The cousin then cleverly grabbed the victim by her clothes and moved her to safety. Both girls were lucky not to suffer serious injury.

The human body conducts electricity. If any part of the body receives an electric shock, the electricity will flow through the tissues with little obstruction. Depending on the length and severity of the shock, Injuries can include burns to the skin, burns to internal tissues, electrical interference or damage (or both) to the heart, which could cause the heart to stop or beat erratically.

How to help a victim of electric shock

The first thing you must do is disconnect the power supply. Don't even touch the victim until you are sure that the power supply is turned off. Be especially careful in wet areas, such as bathrooms, as water conducts electricity. It may be safer to turn off the electricity supply to the building, if possible, to be absolutely sure.

First aid for electrical shock includes:

- Check for a person's response and breathing. It may be necessary to commence CPR.
- Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance. If you are unsure of resuscitation techniques, the ambulance call-taker will give you easy-to-follow instructions over the telephone, so you can increase the person's chances of survival until the ambulance arrives.
- If their breathing is steady and they are responsive, attend to their injuries. Cool the burns with cool running water for 20 minutes and cover with dressings, if available, that won't stick. Simple cling wrap found in most kitchens is very suitable to cover burns as long as it is not applied tightly. Never put ointments or oils onto burns. If the person has fallen from a height, try not to move them unnecessarily in case they have spinal injuries. Only move them if there is a chance of further danger from the environment (such as falling objects).
- Talk calmly and reassuringly to the person.
- Sometimes victims of electric shock may appear to be unhurt, but they should still be treated as a victim of electric shock. Some injuries and further complications may not yet be obvious.
 An examination in hospital is important after any electric shock.

Safety tips around the home

In our case our victim was staying in an older home that was not fitted with safety switches. A safety switch, or residual current device, is designed to save lives by monitoring power flow and making sure the flow is even. This is different to a circuit breaker, which is designed to protect household wiring from power surges.

A safety switch is intended to trip out an electricity supply in the event of a current flow to earth. It can provide protection from harmful electric shocks in situations where a person comes into contact with a live electrical circuit and provides a path to earth. Typical examples of this occurring are with the use of faulty electrical leads and faulty appliances. These switches operate in one thirty-thousandth of a second. You can reduce the risk of electric shock in your home by taking a few precautions, including:

- Always hire a licensed electrician for all wiring jobs.
- Don't use extension leads or appliances if the cords are damaged or frayed.

- Don't remove a plug from a power point by pulling on the cord – pull the plug instead.
- Keep electrical appliances away from wet areas.
- Have safety switches installed by an electrician.
- Buy portable power boards with built-in safety switches.
- Insert safety plugs into power points not in use to stop children from inserting objects into them.

Downed powerlines

Sometimes, powerlines are downed in car accidents. The powerlines may drape over the vehicles. The tyres act as insulation, so urge anyone inside the car to stay there where they will be safe from electric shock. Do not approach the scene until it has been declared safe by the proper authorities. Stand well back and try to encourage any bystanders to keep a distance of at least six metres.

Even if the lines or wires are not moving, they may still be live. All wires should be treated as if they are live. If a person is forced to get out of the vehicle because of a hazard such as fire, instruct them to keep their feet close together and to jump away, not walk. This can reduce the chance of an electric shock if wires are on the ground. Only advise this action if the person is definitely unable to remain in the vehicle.

Friends of Bethanga Creek

It has been a good start to the year for Friends of Bethanga Creek. We held another working bee on the 30th of January and very big thanks to all who helped out on the day. The blackberry spraying was completed in a few short hours as we had a really effective kill from the 2015 spraying and just mopping up small areas of re-growth was needed. Following the 2015 DELWP burn, many of the native species are showing signs of recovery, with plenty of new growth and many new plants emerging with the good summer rains. We are in the process of arranging a follow up working bee to target the broad leaf weeds and we aim to complete this in March. So what is planned for 2016? This year we are going to target the Talgarno Gap Rd branch of the creek. The works are planned to control the Elm suckers which are smothering the ground behind the old CFA shed and also to improve two of the erosion gullies which lead into the creek. We are currently in negotiations with the North East Catchment Management Authority (NECMA) and the Towong Shire about funding for these works. Our meetings have been very productive and we will keep everyone informed through the Berringa News and the Bethanga Recreation Reserve Facebook page.

TALGARNO CFA

Apart from the Barnawartha fires it has been a relatively quiet fire season for your brigade. Since July 2015, 24 members of the brigade responded to 10 callouts, mainly in support of other brigades. Although we did all the planning and applied for all the permits, we were unable to burn roadsides this year. It seems that there was a high degree of anxiety in the authority after the Lancefield incident and the brigade was told at the last minute that we could not proceed. This has prompted the brigade to pay more attention to fuel reduction outside of the fire season and there will be more information about that at the next General Meeting.

There has been good support for the monthly BBQ and about 40% of the community have made donations to the brigade. We have several new members this year and a number of the recently trained members have already made much appreciated contributions to the brigade operations. We are always keen to recruit new members so please let your Captain Peter Star know if you are interested in joining.

The Brigade Management Team held a meeting on February 4, 2016 and some of the matters discussed are noted below:

• Agreed to purchase replacement chest freezer

- Agreed that we recommend to the GM that the next 5 scanners would be sold at \$150 each
- Agreed that brigade would pay for BART services for up to 10 brigade members (\$150 per year) with priority given to those who have responded to callouts. (BART has indicated that it will no longer be a free service)
- Advised that the Victorian Commission for gambling and liquor regulation had returned our application for a licence because the brigade was not an incorporated body
- Agreed that brigade would investigate applying under next round of VESEP for replacement of Slipon based on advice provided by Region 24
- Agreed that brigade would continue to use the roster system over the peak fire season
- Noted that an orange portable radio is still missing
- Noted that the brigade has current assets of \$33,166.63

There will be a general meeting on Tuesday 26 April to elect officers of the brigade and to conduct general business. A notice will be sent around to advise further details and all community members are encouraged to attend and let us know your needs and suggestions. Also, we are looking for a secretary, so if you are interested or would like to nominate anybody, please do so.

22 December 4:04pm Grass and scrub fire Murray Valley Hwy Granya. 4 members responded in tanker 2 to assist Granya and Talgarno. The fire was small on the side of the road and we were called off en route.

25 December 5:40pm Grass and Scrub fire Flagstaff Rd Bethanga. 18 members responded in both trucks, slip-on and private units; Bonegilla, Talgarno and air attack also responded. The 1ha fire started from a vehicle driven in the paddock and it spread rapidly across the road to a neighbouring property. The fire was brought under control quickly.

1 January 6:39pm Grass and scrub fire Maher Hill Bonegilla. 4 members responded in tanker 1 to assist Bonegilla. The fire was started by lightning.

23 January 11:27am
Assist police and ambulance with an electrical hazard in Bellbridge.
8 members responded in tanker
2 and the slip-on. The hazard was brought under control by police and an electrician and we returned after a short time.

FIRE DANGER PERIOD

The fire danger period restrictions will cease sometime in the next couple of months. The exact date varies depending on conditions and is decided by discussions between CFA, DELWP and Councils. Before you light a fire it is your responsibility to check for any CFA and Council restrictions.

Apart from the Indigo Fire early in the summer, our brigade, and indeed the whole of CFA District 24. has been fortunate that there has been very little requirement for our services so far this year. Long may this state continue! Please remember to remain vigilant for the remainder of the Fire Danger Period. It is so easy to be complacent. A little thought and planning before commencing a job can avoid a fire. The law is now very strict that if a fire gets out of your control during any time of the year causing damage to someone else's property, police will investigate and may issue charges.

BEFORE WINTER

Please be sure to clean your chimneys, heater flues, fans, clothes driers (for lint build up) and check electric blankets before use. Consider upgrading to a modern electric blanket that has safety features such as: automatic turn off, countdown timer and over temperature turn off.

Every home should have fire alarms. Fire alarms should be checked regularly and CFA recommends fire alarm batteries should be replaced annually at Easter, regardless of the residual battery life. For your best protection each home should also have a fire blanket and dry chemical fire extinguisher.

A dry chemical fire extinguisher is suitable for electrical, oil and wood/paper fires and could easily save your home from burning down. Remember that all brigade members are volunteers. It takes time for a crew to reach the fire station and turn out to a fire, and then travel to the incident. Having an extinguisher and fire blanket, and knowing how to use them, is your best chance at saving your property from severe damage.

If you need any help with the use of fire equipment, please contact the brigade.

RECENT ACTIVITIES

On Australia Day Bethanga and Baranduda Brigades were display at Bunnings, Wodonga to celebrate the day. Members handed out information showed the public over the trucks which included hands-on practical demonstrations. The public showed gratitude to members and the CFA for their volunteer work. A Bunnings fundraising BBQ organized by our brigade is scheduled during the coming winter period.

On the weekend of April 29th to May 1st, the Bethanga Brigade, together with the Talgarno Brigade, Bethanga CERT and the Bethanga Cricket Club will raise funds by running the car parking at the 4WD Camping Show. If you can assist at this event or the forthcoming BBQ, please contact Jon O'Neil.



The Mitta to Murray Blackberry Action Group or M2M BAG have been very active around the peninsula and has managed to get many new members who are seeking advice and moral support in attacking their blackberry problem. In my street alone three people have signed up over the last couple of weeks. Paula Sheehan as the face of the group is always willing to help a landowner by providing a plan showing how best to attack the issue. Her guidance and advice is incredible and she doesn't put any pressure on you as she understands we are all in different situations. M2M BAG now has 29 Bethanga properties totalling 1100Ha under active management plans! Please let us know if you would like Paula to contact you about your blackberry issues?

Bethanga Landcare Group

In January the Wises Creek Talgarno Landcare Group conducted an excellent briefing on the Rabbit Haemorrhagic Virus at Tallangatta and we would like to thank them for inviting us. The briefing was well attended and covered many aspects of the virus including: how it will be released, the procedure for requesting vials of the virus and the possible effects on the rabbit population. It is possible when the virus is released that it could kill up to 40 or 50% of the rabbits in a particular area. If the virus is successful and we follow up by destroying the warrens we will have a much reduced population of rabbits for at least 17 years. Our President, Roger Barrows will speak further on the subject at our annual general meeting.

With autumn upon us, now is the time to start planting trees and shrubs on your property in order to give them the best chance of survival over the summer months. Our group will be continuing with its successful Tree Giveaway and National Tree Day plantings. The tree giveaway is open to all paid-up members of the group, so for \$15 a year, you will receive a minimum of 40 trees and/or shrubs. Certainly one of the best deals in the area. We are looking for locations to conduct our National Tree Day plantings, so if you have any ideas please contact us and let us know your thoughts.

We hope to soon be engaging a facilitator to assist us in updating our 2002 Local Area Plan so that it is once again relevant for the many changes that have occurred within the area.

Our first meeting for 2016 was held at the Hotel Granya on Friday 19 February with nine members attending and Draft minutes have been circulated.

Our 2016 AGM will be held on **Wednesday 20 April** 2016 at the Talgarno Primary School, commencing at 7:30 pm. We're delighted to have guest speakers **Tim Enshaw** (Community Wild Dog Control Coordinator | Hume, Department of Environment, Land, Water & Planning) and **Peter Star** (Victorian landholder and VFF representative on the National Wild Dog Action Plan Stakeholder Consultative Group) give a joint

presentation on *Wild Dog Management*. Join us for supper at the conclusion of the AGM.

On Monday 18 January, the Mitta to Murray Blackberry Action Group (M2MBAG) and North East Catchment Management Authority (NECMA) co-hosted the Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus (RHDV) Boost Road Show at the Tallangatta Bowling Club.

The roadshow was attended by over 50 local landowners, with presentations from Dr Tarnya Cox project leader and research officer (NSW DPI, Orange) and John Matthews, Biosecurity Manager (Vic DEDJTR). It covered the Invasive Animals CRC Boost project - RHDV (pathogenic calicivirus), integrated rabbit management, landholder participation in the RHDV Boost project and Where to next — the future release of a new strain of RHDV1 K5.

The national release will be coordinated by the Invasive Plants and Animals Committee in consultation with Australian Wool Innovation and Meat and Livestock Australia.

The project release team were looking for groups of landholders to act as release sites or broad-scale sites. Any site can be a release site; however, there are some minimum requirements for broad-scale sites. Each site will involve *pre-release and post-release sampling*.

Our landcare group sought an indication from members as to their willingness to participate in this monitoring

program and five landholders responded and an Expression of Interest on behalf of the WCTLG for the Rabbit Monitoring Program (RHD K₅) was submitted in early January.

M2MBAG and NECMA are currently reviewing how best to assist in the national release likely to take place in **spring 2016 or autumn 2017** (pending approvals).

The State Government of Victoria is (currently) making no allocation of funds to its release, however 600 vials will be provided free to the community at the registered release sites. Each vial will treat 150 ha (10 kg of carrot) and will be available for purchase at approximately \$140 per vial, post the monitored release.

Biocontrol is not a silver bullet and other control methods such as baiting, fumigation, warren ripping, exclusion fencing, shooting and trapping – done humanely – are also needed in line with biocontrol to maintain rabbit numbers at low levels.

Community assistance with the spread of RHDV K5 will help ensure that the virus reaches as many rabbit populations as possible. The community can then take advantage of this knockdown by following up with conventional control tools to achieve sustainable long-term control.

We would like to welcome all families and children back to kinder.


The children have attended five sessions this term, so they are still


