

## **Great River Road Gateway Plans**

Stage 2 of *The Great River Road* project will receive \$5 million in funding from the Victorian Government's *Bushfire Recovery Regional Economic Stimulus and Resilience Fund*.

The project aims to build on the existing 153km Great River Road from Bellbridge to Khancoban, to make it a premier destination for drivers, motorcyclists, cyclists, bushwalkers and campers. Stage 2 involves the delivery of eight key projects, including town trails, wayside stops and a marketing campaign.

Two of the wayside stops are at the Berringa Peninsula end of the Great River Road. The first is at the current location of the Great River Road sign near Trewalla Road and the second on the old road entered from the entrance of 641 Murray River Road, Talgarno.

Nexus Minerals Limited (ASX:NXM) is a gold and base metals exploration targeting large scale gold and copper deposits in the Eastern Goldfields of Western Australia and the North East of Victoria.

Nexus recently signed an Option to Purchase the Bethanga copper – gold exploration licences EL006920 & EL006517 from Jamieson Minerals Pty Ltd which are located within the Towong shire region of North East Victoria. The two licences cover a combined area of 194km<sup>2</sup> and include historic mining areas which were mined in the early 1900's.

## Berringa Peninsula Community Network (BPCN)



The Network aims to support and encourage advancement of the Berringa Peninsula and ensure that in the event of another disaster like the summer of 2019-20, the Berringa community will be in a more prepared and a resilient place with the best chance of safety and positive outcomes for all.

#### Hall and Recreation Reserve Facilities

Consultants AKPS are preparing costings for the priorities developed by each of the committees of Bethanga, Granya and Talgarno Halls. This will be used to apply for a large joint grant that opens in July. If this grant application is not successful, the individual halls can apply for other smaller grants.

The Bushfires Recovery Victoria will work with the Bethanga Recreation Reserve to apply for a separate facilities grant

#### **Great River Road**

The committee is working with the Council to provide community input into the two wayside stops in our area. See page 1.

#### **Bushfire Preparedness Survey**

We received a small number of responses to our Bushfire Preparedness survey. This means we can't be sure that the responses are representative of the concerns and thoughts of the wider Peninsula community. However, they did hint at some of the concerns the community had. A selection of ten recurring ideas for bushfire preparedness resources were taken from this information and were taken back to the community for ranking in order of importance. This was conducted at the Peninsula Seasonal Market held in Talgarno in March 2021 and was also included as a survey on our Facebook page.

The ten themes were

- Bushfire preparedness workshops
- Installation and use of water pump workshops
- Assistance with preparing an escape plan
- Regular community meetings during a fire event
- Frequently updated website with fire related information specific to the Peninsula region
- Physical place with fire related information specific to the Peninsula region
- Better communication infrastructure (mobile

network)

- A clearly identifiable evacuation site for each township
- Increased community water storage
- Alternative power sources for local halls/ community centres

We are currently collating the results and the results will be provided to the appropriate organisations to action.

## **Prospects for the Season Ahead**

Thank you to Greg Hayes who has agreed to regularly contribute weather related articles for Berringa Community News readers.



## Rainfall Round-up

Well this autumn had two parts – a good bit and a bad bit. February and March were better than average and April was awful. The driest April since 1967, 95% of all Aprils since records began have been wetter. In an average year the autumn rainfall (February to end April) would be 142 mm. This year it was 134 mm at TAFCO station (de Hennin's), 130 mm at Hume Reservoir and 137 mm at my place. The Hume reading was 92% of average (142 mm) but 121% of the median (109 mm) meaning that 50% of all autumns have had less than 109 mm and 50% more.



The rain in February and March came from what were fairly normal conditions – The Sub-tropical ridge of high pressure was over Adelaide and there were some good moisture sources about. By the end of March the BOM declared the La Niña event over with the SOI returning to neutral. Then moving into April, persistent high pressures over southern Australia and a positive Southern Annular Mode (SAM) kept rain-bearing fronts south of us over the rest of April, leading to the exceptionally dry period.

BOM said it was likely we would get more than the median (120 mm) for autumn and we did but only just. They always reference the median rainfall and not the average and often these are quite different.

It seems that the May rainfall is likely to be close to average with 40 mm already recorded mid May.

## Prospects for Winter (June to end August)

Since May will be over by the time this report is published, I have skipped May! Conditions for the main drivers of climate have all returned to neutral or their influence isn't important at this time of year. BOM seems to be a bit uncertain about the June to August outlook. On May 18, they said it was likely that we would get more than the median. Now, May 2021, they say it is equally likely that the rainfall will be above or below the median, that is the median winter rainfall of 227 mm is the most likely. (By the way it is interesting to note that BOM says the median is 227 mm for Talgarno, 301 mm for Bethanga and 220 mm for Lake Hume Village).



There is a bit of a hint that the Indian Ocean Dipole might become negative which would make a wetter winter more likely but it is too early to tell. Ten out of 12 models analysed by Agriculture Victoria expect average winter rainfall and warmer temperatures. Sorry I can't be more definite, best to be prepared for anything ... as usual!

Pruning, pruning and then a bit more pruning is on the gardening job menu for the next few months.

Any of your perennials in the garden need to have been pruned by now. If you haven't managed to get out to do that, don't worry just give them a bit of a clean-up now rather than a harder prune, or wait till later spring if they're not looking too bad.

With native trees and shrubs, they like a bit of a tip prune and clean up in autumn. Deciduous trees and shrubs can still be pruned over the next few months.

When pruning, look for 'inward' facing branches or branches that are crossing over or entangled in each other. This can help 'open' up the plant for a bit more air circulation and movement that can help a bit with pests and diseases.

Also look for any damaged or diseased looking branches and wood.

'Crown lifting' is another pruning method that can open up some more garden space for you or perhaps make mowing a bit more of a pleasure. Pruning (crown lifting) the branches of your tree from the bottom is a great way to open up some more garden space, make room for a lovely garden seat or just create a sense of more space in your garden. one to a warmer site for winter.

Also, a great time to check your chooks and ducks are set up for winter with nice fresh, thick bedding and that their bedrooms are nice and warm and not drafty.

In the vegie patch we can still be planting out broccoli, spring onions and strawberry plants.

Don't forget to plant your onions after the winter solstice. They love the cold days to form nice big bulbs.

Plant your bare rooted plants before the shortest day. When the weather starts warming up the sap starts to run through the plant, waking it up for spring.

Don't forget to pop into the Bethanga Post Office to see some of Bethanga Blooms specialty pots and some of Felicity's gorgeous wares.

Watch this space, there are exciting things happening for Bethanga Blooms, coming soon.

### Hard and Green Waste collection - 2021

## Bethanga - Stockpile site, Talgarno Gap Rd, east of CFA Shed Saturday 9 October - 10am to 1pm Granya - Stockpile site, south of Murray River Rd., Sunday 10 October - 10am to 1pm

Towong Shire will run a hard and green waste collection service at the following locations and times, on the dates shown below. Dumping of waste at the nominated sites outside the specified collection times is illegal and offenders will be prosecuted.

• We accept standard trailer or Ute loads of non commercial hard waste (couches, stoves, old fencing wire, timber, steel, glass, paper, plastic, nondecomposable, non-hazardous solid wastes) as well as non-commercial green waste (lawn clippings, branches up to 25 cm or 10 inch diameter).

• We do not accept mattresses, bed bases, batteries, tyres, LPG cylinders chemicals, oils, asbestos, paint tins or hazardous waste during these collections (non-

commercial quantities of these items can be dropped off at the Wodonga Resource Recovery Centre).

E-waste, fridges and air conditioners need to be kept separate from hard waste materials. Waste Vouchers issued with Rates Notices can be redeemed, or charges will apply as set out in the Schedule of Fees and Charges. You can also use your Waste Vouchers at the Corryong, Tallangatta or Wodonga Resource Recovery Centres.

## In Memoríum



GLADIS IRENE MERKEL 5 July 1920 – 14 April 2021

Gladis Merkel passed away on the 14 April this year at the age of 100. Gladis had lived in Talgarno for 73 years and had been a valuable member of the Talgarno community.

Gladis saw the transition of Australian society from an

era where transportation transcended from horse drawn vehicles to motorcars, paddle Steamers on the Murray and its tributaries to a railway network in Victoria, the introduction of radios and telephones for everyday use.

Gladis, attended the Emily McPherson College, Melbourne, where she learnt to be a dressmaker. She commenced work as an apprentice dressmaker with Cann's Department Store in Swanston Street, Melbourne. Later she worked at Myer Emporium in Melbourne as a tailoress. During World War II, in about 1942, she was directed by the War Service Department to work in a clothing factory in the suburb of Mentone making Army uniforms. After this duty was completed she worked again at Myer Emporium up until her marriage. She met Stuart Merkel from Talgarno through a work mate in Melbourne and they married in 1946. Gladis and Stuart moved into what was known as the Orchard House in lower Talgarno. Stuart travelled daily from the Orchard House to the land at Talgarno (where they eventually built and lived) to milk cows and farm the land. The new house was built of brick, had two bedrooms and was quite modern for those days, having an indoor toilet and septic tank.

During her many years living at Talgarno, Gladis took great pride in making dresses and gowns for girls and ladies in the district. There are many girls, now ladies, indebted to her for their ball gowns, debut and wedding dresses. She did all of this on her trusty pedal operated Singer sewing machine. Later in life she began to use an electrical sewing machine, but never believed that it was as good as her old Singer.

In about 1970, they built another home on the next-door farm they had purchased years before. In 1997, after 51 years marriage husband Stuart passed away. Gladis continued for more than 20 years to live alone in the family home.

#### **BERRINGA CERT**



May 17 – 23 was volunteer week. I contemplated our small team of volunteers and pondered the future of the CERT team. We have 14 members with an average of 12 years of service. Most weeks we provide 24 hours coverage each day. Three team members, each closer in age to 70 than 60, cover most of the daytime shifts and are on call up to 100 hours per week, including the weekends. The other team members give what time they can. Most of our callouts are between 7 am and 6 pm

Our rural communities have always relied on one another for support in our time of need. In times of community emergencies or crisis, for example bushfire, the community rallies together but for ongoing support for individuals in need, volunteer support is harder to provide.

Our volunteer emergency services model is based on farmers or those working in local business being available 24 hours a day to attend emergency events. In these "busy times" (does that mean previous generations had nothing to do) more people have jobs outside their community and are not available to respond on weekdays.

In addition, over recent years the emergency services agencies have demanded more and more training and checks before anyone can join as a volunteer. In Ambulance Victoria before joining CERT, you need to have completed an interview, reference checks, police check, driver's licence check, obtained a working with children check, completed online learning, plus two weekends face to face training, 1 day driver trainer and 1 weekend manual handling. There is a 12-month probationary period. All up it can be close to two years between "I would like to join CERT" and having an authority to practice.

The future for a local CERT team able to provide daytime coverage is uncertain unless we have more people available during the day. Will no CERT team make a difference to our community? In most cases no, locals may have to wait an extra 15 minutes until an ambulance arrives, but it could also be the

difference between life and death.

#### **CHIMNEY FIRES**

Your chimney or flue is designed to carry dangerous gases from your fireplace, wood stove or heater safely out of your home. Our brigade has attended many chimney fires over the years so don't think it won't happen to you. Chimney fires can burn fiercely, loudly and dramatically enough to be detected by neighbours or people passing by. Chimney fires can also be slow-burning and can often go undetected until they spread to nearby combustible parts of the house.

Preventing chimney fires:

- Clean chimneys don't catch fire. Clean and inspect your solid fuel chimney annually before winter and repair any faults.
- Burn dry seasoned wood.
- Allow adequate air supply so wood burns, not smoulders.
- Be aware, and investigate, changes to your wood fires performance or odours.

## EXCURSION

On Wednesday the 18 May, we explored food and fibre production by going on an excursion, with Bethanga Primary School, to Tanybryn Farm, Wolki Farm and Harris Farmers Market. Firstly, we went to the Tanybryn farm to learn about how the farmers there work. Rachel (one of the farmers) gave each of us a task to plant something such as garlic cloves, tulips and potatoes.

Then we drove to Wolki Farm in Thurgoona. Firstly, we looked at the market garden and owner Jacob explained what cafes he owns. Secondly, we looked at the fat pigs in the orchard and Jacob explained all about how the pigs protect the orchards as well as getting ready for the market. Thirdly, we saw the chicks in the cage sitting under the heat lamps and he said 400 chicks come in every 2 months and he sends them to be made into chicken nuggets. He said he had over a hundred pigs living on the farms. Then, we saw how Jacob transfers the chooks cages so that they get fresh grass to eat all day. After that, we made our way to Oddies Creek Park for lunch and play. When Mrs Saunders blew the whistle, we came back onto the bus and made our way to Harris Farm markets. Once the tour guides (Clive and Hamish) came, we all split into groups and they told us the story of how the three Harris brothers made a company and spread it across the whole of Australia. Here are some comments from the seniors and juniors who went on the tour:

"We learnt that you could pour milk out of a tap instead of getting it in a jug, and we saw someone making the donuts in the shop and we saw the flour getting made into bread" Harleigh Winter.

"I learnt a lot about the local produce and where things came from, getting to try some of the foods I haven't tried before. We got \$5 to spend on what we wanted" Elsie Star.

## BASKETBALL

We were finally able to get access to some seriously talented basketballers through our sporting schools program. Yesterday Shereece (Import from USA) and Mitch (import from NZ) who both play for the Albury Border Bandits came to put the students through their paces. They were so much fun and shared heaps of great tips to help the students understand how to play the basics in basketball. Mitch actually just played for the tall blacks against the Australian Boomers last month. Pretty amazing to have an international athlete come and play around with the kids here at school!
