Donations are sought to provide defibrillators for Talgarno and Granya.

The chances of surviving a cardiac arrest decreases by 10% with every minute that passes after the arrest. But by increasing the number of Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) out in our communities, we have the power to change the outcome.

Our campaign in 2016 purchased 3 defibrillators. On the Peninsula we now have defibrillators at Bethanga and Bellbridge Shops, on the Bethanga and Talgarno CFA trucks and in the CERT car. For Granya and Talgarno these are a long way away when minutes count.

In Talgarno we cannot be certain that the fire truck will be around, and the hall and tennis courts are regularly used. The closest defibs to Granya are Tallangatta or Walwa and we have functions at the Granya Hotel and The Woolpress. Murray River Road is becoming increasingly busy with tourist traffic and campers.

The plan is to install defibs on the outside of the Talgarno and Granya halls. Training to use the AED and CPR will be provided for residents and the CERT team will maintain them.

The cost of a defibrillator is \$2500. We will be applying for available grants, but we will also need community support.


Prospects for the Season Ahead

Rainfall Round-up

What can I say? The forecast for autumn was for 'average' rainfall! The reality was very average indeed, in fact the driest since 2004 when the total for autumn was 23mm. The autumn rainfall (February to end April) was 61 mm at Hume Reservoir, 43% below average. (It was 66mm at the TAFCO weather station). Autumn started off reasonably with February 81% of average, but then got progressively worse with March 46% and April just 19% of average. April was a shocker with just 10mm which is at the 10th percentile (90% of all Aprils on record have been wetter). As I write this, despite the 27mm so far in May, we still need follow up to say we have had a real autumn break.



Our total rainfall for 2018 to date is 129mm at the TAFCO station.

It has been unseasonally warm over the autumn in part because the lack of rain has kept soils dry and warm but also because a persistent high pressure pushed hot air from the Pilbara and the centre into our region. April was the second hottest on record for Victoria and the maximum temperatures were 3 – 4 degrees above the long term norm. Wagga had 10 consecutive days above 30 degrees in April far exceeding the previous record of 4 days. There is clear evidence of an overlying trend towards warmer temperatures across Australia.

The Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) had suggested that autumn would be about average but I can sympathise with the weather forecasters for getting it wrong this autumn. All the classic weather signals were neutral (SOI, IOD) and there was plenty of potential moisture in the warmer than normal seas to the north of Australia. The Sub Tropical Ridge of high pressure moved into the right place for winter (at the top of the Great Australian Bight) and the pressure over southern Australia was low enough to allow rain. The lack of rain in April was apparently the result of higher than normal pressures in the upper atmosphere which has prevented moisture transport into the region from the tropical oceans. And earlier in the autumn we had persistent high pressure off the WA coast that had the effect of blocking movement of rain-bearing fronts.

Prospects for winter (May to end July)

I know this is likely to bring on a yawn for those of you who are still reading this Rainfall Roundup but, guess what, BOM is suggesting that there is an equal chance that the winter rainfall will be above or below average for the NE. A wetter than average season is forecast for far eastern Victoria and a drier than average season for western Victoria so we're in the middle. There is still no strong signal with any of the climate drivers, neutral SOI, neutral IOD, Sub tropical ridge of high pressure is in the right position, etc. The temperature of the water in Tasman Sea and the seas north of Australia are higher than normal and that potentially provides sources of moisture but everything needs to fall into line for that to lead to better than average rainfall. The BOM seems very confident that the temperatures this winter will be above average.

The BOM has a very good blog dealing with neutral outlook forecasts (<u>http://media.bom.gov.au/social/blog/1699/what-to-expect-from-the-climate-when-the-outlooks-are-neutral</u>). This shows that a neutral outlook doesn't mean that the most likely rainfall will be spot on the average. It includes an interesting graph showing the wide range of actual rainfall that has been recorded in years where the outlooks are neutral. This is in contrast to the situation where there is a strong signal either of El Niño or La Niña in which case the actual rainfalls have been more concentrated into below or above average respectively.

A well know Wises Creek-Talgarno identity Graham Lockhart passed away on the 12th April 2018.

Having your home broken into can be a distressing experience. Many people feel violated with the thought of a stranger going through their personal belongings.

There are however, simple and effective measures you can implement to significantly reduce the incidence of burglary at your home.

To determine how secure your home is, think like a burglar. From the outside of your home, consider how difficult it would be to a would-be thief. Are there any tools lying around your yard that could assist in prying open a window, are there any ladders lying beside the shed, or are trees and shrubs concealing windows providing cover for a burglar while they break in?

Homes without a security system are 3 times more likely to be broken into than homes with one installed. If you can't afford one place a generic sticker in full sight that says "this home is protected by home security".

POLICE CRIME REPORT

Hello All Welcome to winter!

We have had a couple of really good months on the Peninsula with nothing major to report. If everyone keeps showing each other the respect that I have seen we should continue to have a safe community. Well done. Please keep in mind our friends in the community that don't have much support around them and might need a visit over the really cold days (or some fire wood). And if you're escaping the cold tell your neighbours or fill out an Absent from Residence Form.

I have a couple of reminders; please be aware that the roads will become slippery due to the rain and I have seen a couple small incidents of people losing concentration and incidents happening. We need to drive to the conditions. Please try to keep your cattle secured, with the Lake levels dropping I spend most of my day putting cattle back in paddocks; fines do apply for having unsecured cattle.

Also with your vehicles make sure you pay the registration, the fine for driving an unregistered vehicle is \$793.00 which is more than actually paying the rego. If in doubt log onto

<u>https://www.vicroads.vic.gov.au/registration</u> and check it's up to date, because you won't be insured if you crash.

Unfortunately we have had a couple incidents of illegal shooting / trespassing across the Towong Shire. If you plan on shooting wild animals like Kangaroos or Deer make sure you have the appropriate permits in place and permission from land owners. I have seized a number of firearms from poachers, and they may also lose their vehicles and get a summons to court. It's not hard to do the right thing. If you need permits contact Game Management Authority on 136 186 or log onto

http://www.gma.vic.gov.au/licensing/apply-for-a-gamelicence.

Remember if you see something say something. Keep an eye out for your neighbours and they will do the same for you. Protect your Livestock and Report Farm Crime

It has been reported recently that at least \$1.5 million in livestock has been reported stolen in Victoria since the start of last year, however that figure is likely to be much higher as under-reporting of farm crime is recognised as an issue by Victoria Police.

The **agricultural liaison officer program** is Victoria Police's frontline response to crime affecting primary producers.

It relies on officers volunteering to take on the roles in addition to regular duties.

Many farmers fail to report livestock theft because they do not think police can do much about a relatively small scale report, however, one report might provide the final piece of information needed for an investigating officer to solve and complete a livestock investigation and charge a thief.

Things to consider to help farmers to protect themselves from stock loss:

- Tagging their livestock at an early age and not leaving this until the day before a major sale. The National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) is Australia's system for livestock identification (ear tags, microchips etc). It enables livestock to be tracked from their property of birth to slaughter.
- Secure loading ramps and stockyards to prevent unauthorised use.
- Photographing and videoing your livestock regularly to assist with identification.
- Keep receipts / records of any purchase as proof of ownership.
- Keep track of any agisted stock and their markings.
- Check stock numbers regularly, especially those out of view from the homestead.
- Remember no matter how small your loss, always report livestock theft.
- Victoria Police urge anyone who may have information related to any farming or livestock theft incident to contact Crime Stoppers or their local Police Station.

Do you know how much it costs to call an ambulance?

If you live in a rural area, you will be charged \$1776 for an emergency and \$549 for a non-emergency transport. There is no extra charge per kilometres travelled. If you require air transport it would be around \$3000 and helicopter transport could be between \$10,000 and \$25,000.

There are no Ambulance charges for Pensioner and Health Care Card holders, Department of Veterans' Affairs Gold Card or White Card holders. In the case of road accidents, the ambulance costs are generally paid by the Transport Accident Commission and workplace accidents are generally paid by the Victorian WorkCover Authority.

Ambulance cover through Ambulance Victoria costs \$92.05 a year for a family or \$46 for a single person. If you purchase a Family Membership, you, your partner and dependent children under the age of 17 and living under the same roof or over 17 and under 25, **studying full time** will be covered.

Ambulance Victoria Membership includes:

- All emergency road ambulance transport;
- All MICA (Mobile Intensive Care Ambulance) attendance and treatment;
- All emergency air ambulance and clinically necessary non-emergency air ambulance;
- All ambulance treatment when transport is not required;
- All clinically necessary non-emergency patient transport;
- Emergency ambulance treatment and transport services provided while interstate.

Please also be aware that when you have ambulance cover with a private health insurance company they do not purchase Ambulance Victoria membership. Private health insurers set their own terms and conditions of what they will and will not cover.

Ambulance Victoria recommends you contact your fund and use the Ambulance Cover Checklist as a guide to determine if you have sufficient ambulance cover.

- Does my policy cover me for all ambulance services such as treatment, road and air?
- Does my policy cover all emergency transport?

- What is the funds definition of an emergency?
- What if I am not admitted to hospital after ambulance care and transport?
- If someone calls an ambulance for me but I do not require ambulance care, will I be covered for the cost of an ambulance call out?
- Am I covered for non-emergency transport?
- If I require ambulance services while interstate will I be covered?
- If I require transport by ambulance from an interstate hospital will I be covered?
- Do exclusions exist under my policy? If yes, what are they?



Welcome to the winter update from Talgarno Fire Brigade. Although the fire season is over please take care with lighting fires around your house or in paddocks as it is still very dry. A bit of wind could easily spread a fire. Please ensure you patrol fires and have adequate firefighting equipment on hand, just in case.

If you are conducting a significant planned burn please make us aware. Notify the Emergency Services Telecommunications Authority (ESTA). You can do this in the following ways: Phone 1800 668 511 and provide the required information. Complete the Burn off Notification Form from CFA website.

Email the form to <u>burnoffs@esta.vic.gov.au</u> or by fax: 1300 674 428.

Use the National Relay Service by ringing 1300 555 727 and ask for Information to be relayed to ESTA via 1800 668 511

Winter brings with it different fire risks. Particularly in the home as we attempt to stay warm using heaters and fires, cook indoors more and use appliances like dryers. Consider these tips to stay safe over the cooler months:

• Make sure heaters are off before going to bed or going out.



- Keep clothing, curtains or toys one metre away from heaters.
- Keep grills, fans and cooking surfaces free from grease and residue.
- Change smoke alarm batteries every year.
- Test and vacuum smoke alarms monthly.
- Ensure you have a smoke alarm outside every sleeping area.
- Clean chimneys and flues every year.
- Always use a fire screen in front of an open fire.
- Keep candles, incense, and oil burners away from anything flammable.
- Don't leave electric blankets on for more than 30 minutes.
- Never put weight (people, animals or objects) on your bed while the electric blanket is on.
- Clean the lint filter on your clothes dryer after each load.
- Let the clothes dryer complete its cool down cycle before stopping.




