

Cradle Mountain Overland: 62 kilometres of ancient rainforests and pristine alpine country, through rain, mud and even snow.

It was earlier this year when, as part of a group of Tallangatta Secondary College students, I travelled to Tasmania to complete the famous Overland Track. It was a big ask for a group of roughly ten teenagers to be camping with little bedding, no showers and without mobile service for a week. But we got through and we loved it. Our trek started with the journey from Ronny Creek to Water Valley hut. One thing I remember about that day was dragging myself up the steep side of a mountain, using chains to lift myself up. It was painful, but the view from the top of the mountain was unbelievable. You could see for miles – it seemed as if the hills didn't end. The first sleep back at camp was pretty rough. It wasn't until deep into that first night that I realised how cold Tasmania can really get.

The rest of our days walking took us through all different types of environments. One day we would be walking through wide open scrub. Then the next through enclosed green rainforest. But no matter where we were, the views were stunning. The weather changed nearly as much as the scenery. It would rain one minute and be all sun the next. This caused a lot of nights trapped in tents playing cards, waiting for the rain to stop.

One of the main things I remember was getting ambushed by massive possums, getting no sleep, having to stay up listening to possums scratching at out tents and scurrying around trying to scavenge crumbs from our dinner. We had to be so careful with what we left outside our tent because when we weren't organised enough we would get a visitor in the night time. This seemed to happen a lot. The walk also had its demanding parts. After a night's rain the track would get messy and very slippery. It was challenging, walking up those slippery slopes with 20 kilos strapped to our backs. The mud-ridden paths resulted in lots of water-filled shoes, soggy socks and some funny stacks. But this all just made the trip more memorable.

Overall, it was an incredible experience and one that I definitely won't be forgetting for a long time.

Berringa Cert hoped to raise enough money to buy two defibs but, as it happened last fund raising, we have enough money to buy three. We thank the community for your generosity -- we have raised \$8620. We particularly thank Peninsular Neighbourhood Watch for their donation of \$4200 but regret that it is because they have gone into recess. We also thank Talgarno CFA for their donation of \$500 and all the patrons of the Bethanga Hotel and the Bethanga Shop who gave us their change.

We will install defibrillators at the Talgarno Hall, Granya Hall and Bethanga Recreation Reserve as soon as we can.

The defibrillators are designed to be used by people who have no experience, but CERT will run sessions to improve people's confidence with the defibrillator and CPR. Keep your eyes open for dates of the familiarisation sessions.

Back to the Drawing Board for the Pizza Shelter.

Thanks to all of those who chased after votes for our project for development of the Recreation Reserve and the construction of a shelter for the pizza oven. Unfortunately we were unsuccessful in our application for funding from the Victorian government under their Pick my project initiative. It seems that we just didn't get enough votes to get us over the line – not surprising I guess, given that we were competing with generally much larger communities.

Despite having missed out on this round of funding, there are some positives that came out of the exercise. We now have some good ideas about the need to plan for the longer term development of the Rec reserve and to progressively put in place the improvements people want. We know that the monthly community BBQ is very well supported and that gives us confidence that a shelter and some seating would be widely used and valued. So, we are going to find some way to build it! We are looking for other sources of funding and considering trying to raise some money ourselves so that we can progressively make the improvements that everybody seems to want. In April, this year Narelle and I and our daughter Isabella were invited to attend a 'Commemoration of the Battle of Fromelles and Headstone Rededication Ceremony' on July 19. It was to commemorate the 102nd anniversary of the two-day battle on the western front in northern France where many Australian soldiers were killed. Narelle's mum Claire had for many years talked about her personal family grief regarding the loss of her Uncle, Captain Kenneth Mortimer (from Leneva) who was reported missing in action at the battle of Fromelles. His body was never found and his fate unknown. Historians tell us this battle was an unmitigated disaster with 5,500 Australian casualties. Almost 2,000 killed in action or died of wounds and some 400 were captured. This battle was believed to be the greatest loss by a single division in 24 hours, for the entire First World War. All reports indicated that Captain Mortimer was commanding a company from the 29th battalion and they had made it across 400 yards of 'no-mans' land' to the German front line. Historians say as he ordered his men to retreat, Captain Mortimer was moving forward to warn others and he was never seen again. He was only 20 years of age.

Fast forward this story to 2008. A Melbourne amateur historian, 'Lambis Englezos' after many years of perseverance finally persuaded the Australian government that a mass grave existed at Fromelles. They established a team of scientists to locate and recover the bodies of 250 Australian and British soldiers. The Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery was established in 2010 where they were buried in unmarked graves with full military honours. Scientists used DNA testing (a complex and lengthy process) to identify the soldiers. To date 159 soldiers have been identified. Narelle's mum Claire offered to participate to provide DNA when the Australian War Memorial put out the call to relatives of missing soldiers back in 2010. In January of this year Captain Kenneth Mortimer was identified. Finally, he could have his name dedicated on a headstone and could be laid to rest, along with 8 others identified this year. Fourteen of Ken's family members travelled from Australia, Britain and Ireland

Our trip to France was much more than an adventurous to attend. Narelle would've loved to have taken her Mum to her at the ceremony.



Isabella, Narelle and I were moved by the service which included speeches from officials from France and Australia, the bagpipes played and flag bearers representing every legion in France attended. Most of the village of Fromelles (900 people) witnessed the service. In a moving moment Bella and Narelle were the final guests to lay flowers at the 'Cross of Sacrifice' and tears flowed freely amongst villagers who attended. For our own private dedication, we left some rocks on Ken's grave that we'd collected from the family farm at Fromelles Primary School who were holding a poster above and the red poppies dance; lest we forget. Captain Mortimer's headstone, which read; 'We won't forget you Cobber!'

One Man's Story- Michael Ernest Sutherland

Michael Ernest Sutherland was known as Ernie. Ernie's father, Ernie was appointed as a driver on 22nd March 1918 just as Michael Owen Sutherland was manager of Argo gold dredge at Sandy Creek in 1905 when Ernie enlisted on 22nd July 1915



in Melbourne. He was 20 years old and gave his occupation as a miner

He trained with the 11th reinforcements, 14th Battalion at Seymour, Ballarat and Broadmeadows until 17th September and on 11th October sailed to Egypt. By the time they arrived in Egypt, the Australian Infantry Forces was being reorganised and on 16th March 1916, Ernie was mustered as a gunner in the 45th Battery of the

newly formed 12th Field Artillery Brigade. In Ernie's battery at As Ernie had enlisted early in the war, he was in a high this time the guns would have been 18-pound field guns which had a range of almost six kilometres and fired a range of ammunition including high explosive fragmentation, shrapnel, smoke, gas, star illumination and armour piercing projectiles.

During the battle of Fromelles later in July, the 45th battery was engaged in cutting wire entanglements on the front line. For the next three months the men spent only short periods in training camps between operations in the field near Ypres, Belgium. Their work included constructing new gun positions, providing harassing and retaliatory fire, raiding enemy trenches and manning the wagon lines, often under enemy bombardment and aircraft shelling. As their guns were horse drawn, a wagon line of horses and supporting wagons would be set up behind the front line out of range of enemy fire. Men came back there for rest and food and each night under cover of darkness the gunners would be resupplied with ammunition and supplies by wagons from the wagon lines.

In mid November 1916, the Brigade was moved to the Somme region to provide support in the trenches during the difficult, cold, wet winter. On 12th March 1917 the 12th Field Artillery Brigade were involved in wire cutting and bombardment of enemy trenches at Frèchencourt, near Amiens, when Ernie was wounded. He was admitted to hospital with gunshot wounds to the left thigh.

He left Southampton on 6th November and rejoined his battery in the wagon lines near Dickebusch, Belgium on the 12th. For four months the 12th Field Artillery Brigade remained in this region, often on the front line providing harassing fire and enduring enemy shelling and gas attacks.

the brigade moved back over the border into northern France to assist in stemming the great German spring offensive. For the next two months it saw heavy enemy action near St Omer, as well as the added risk of the Spanish influenza epidemic. In fact, there was little rest for the men of the 12th Field Artillery Brigade as they provided the artillery support for many brigades in the fierce fighting that raged in this area until August. On 5th August they were moved back to the Somme region where they took part in the Battle of Amiens which broke the enemy defences and drove them back in a disastrous loss for the Germans. The Brigade then went on to participate in breaching the main enemy defensive line in Picardy and to assist at successful battles on the Hindenberg line at St Quentin. By the time Ernie took four week's leave from 26th October he had been on the battlefront almost continually in action for twelve months.

priority group for repatriation to Australia. He arrived in Melbourne on 31st May 1919 and was discharged on 25th July.

Ernie's father, Michael, had left Sandy Creek to live at Bethanga in 1916 after the closure of the Argo dredge and Ernie initially joined his family there. However, in 1921 and 1922 he is listed as a farmer at Moyhu. He married Mary Agnes Woods from Chiltern in Wangaratta in 1922. The couple moved back to Bethanga for a short time but from 1925 they lived in Melbourne where Ernie worked for the railways. They had three children (two daughters and a son). By 1920 Ernie's father had become the licensee of the Court House Hotel and he and wife Lily were running that and the store and post office.

On 23rd May 1929 Ernie, while on a holiday from his job at Spencer Street railway station, was tragically killed, aged 33, when the car in which he was travelling with two friends, William and Michael Toohey, on a foggy night plunged off a bridge into Red Creek near Bethanga. His friends were able to scramble free but Ernie was drowned. He left a widow and three young children. His wife, Mary, is listed as living at the family's Court House Hotel from 1931 to 1937 but her whereabouts after that are unknown.

Michael died 1932 and Lily took over as the licensee of the hotel until her death in 1948. In a sale of the large amount of property owned by Michael and her, their daughter Maggie Benson bought the Court House hotel for £7875.

Ernie, his father and his mother are all buried in the Bethanga cemetery.

Local Teacher Publishes her First Children's Book

Christine Cameron, a teacher in the kinder room at Bellbridge CEYC (formerly Berringa Kindergarten), has just published her first children's book, an alphabet of Australian birds. Christine has had a love of birds since becoming a member of the Gould League of Bird Lovers, when in primary school. She was very taken with both the beautiful coloured certificate, framed by her parents, featuring several Australian birds and the accompanying badge, which featured a red capped robin. She fondly remembers growing up near Colac and enjoying her grandfather's many photos of birds, her Nana's chooks and her parents' canaries and budgies. Now Christine's own family continues to be surrounded by birds, sharing her husband's large aviary of finches.

Like many school children, Christine wrote and illustrated a book during primary school literacy sessions and was quite proud of the result. I guess at the time, she didn't envisage actually publishing one in the future! However in the 1980's she started to write a children's picture story book, but for various reasons, didn't get to follow it through. Several months ago Christine was inspired by another local author's alphabet book about alpacas and after some investigations discovered alphabet books that combined animals and birds, but nothing specifically on Australian birds. Her encouragement of the children's interest in and observations of the birds visiting the play area at the kindergarten and their learning of the alphabet, spurred on Christine's decision to act.

After contacting Birdlife Australia, Steve Parish and some time spent on Google, Christine found Fiona Sinclair, an illustrator whose drawings really appealed and who was very keen to proceed. Christine then set about writing the text and preparing some suitable children's activities, an addition suggested by the publisher. As Fiona had already produced suitable illustrations for an Australian tea towel, minimal time was required to make some minor alterations which helped speed up the process. Christine's husband Matt, a biologist, was a skilled proof reader, checking that all the information and illustrations were accurate and several emails between Christine and Fiona later, the final draft was ready. The manuscript was accepted very quickly by Boolarong Press, the publisher. Within 3 months the entire process was complete and Fly through your ABC - An alphabet of Australian birds' was published.

Christine has ensured that, not only will children learn to recognise and care for some of our wonderful Australian birdlife, discover their habitats, food and nesting habits,

but at the same time her book will support learning the alphabet.

Major funding boost for Bethanga and Eskdale

Towong Shire Council has secured over \$1.16 million in funding for much needed road upgrades as part of the State Government's Fixing Country Roads Program. This grant was the largest awarded to any Council as part of this program, and will be boosted by \$333,150 of ratepayer funds for upgrades.

The funding will deliver substantial improvements to intersections, parking, road surfaces and pedestrian safety in Bethanga and Eskdale, with projects scheduled to be delivered during the first half of 2019.

Towong Shire Council Mayor Cr David Wortmann was pleased to see this investment in Towong Shire.

"This funding will mean we can proceed with several projects we know are important to the communities of Bethanga and Eskdale and deliver significant road improvements," he said. "We hope to begin in Bethanga in early 2019 with Eskdale works commencing soon after."

Cr Wortmann said, "Council will be holding an information session in each town and encourages community members to come along and learn about the proposed improvements and guide Council with its prioritisation of works."

The skate park was of high interest to attendees. A number of attendees requested additional equipment at the skate park. The current skate park infrastructure creates a noise nuisance and many comments suggested replacing the infrastructure surface with concrete to reduce noise.

Although only three comments specifically support the relocation of the cricket nets, there were no specific objections recorded against the proposal.


Prospects for the Season Ahead




Rainfall Round-up

Spring turned out pretty much as predicted – very dry and disappointing. We received a total of 87mm (Tafco station) or 107mm (Hume Reservoir). September with 19mm at Hume and 13 mm at Tafco) was particularly dry with almost 95% of all Septembers on record being wetter. September was bad Australia-wide being the second driest on record. October was almost as bad with only 33mm (Hume) and 22mm (Tafco). For Victoria as a whole, this October was the fifth driest on record.




The low rainfall earlier in spring seems to have been caused by the continuing higher pressure over inland Australia pushing and rain-bearing fronts south. In early September the Indian Ocean Dipole turned positive taking moisture sources away from Australia's tropical northwest towards Africa. This has been a major cause of the lack of rain since then. This phase of the IOD is expected to breakdown soon.

We have now had 10 straight months of below average rainfall. Since 2000, there has been a trend towards decreasing rainfall over the growing season (June – November) whilst the total rainfall has actually tended to increase (admittedly from the low base of the Millenium Drought.



This seems to be a bit of a trend - since 2000, two out of every three springs and winters (both 68%) have been below average. In contrast, only one in two summers (58%) have been below average. As a result it seems that we might be moving towards a more even distribution of rainfall across the year instead of the historical peaks in spring and winter.

Prospects for summer (November to end February)

The BOM say we can expect an average summer in terms of rainfall but warmer than normal. The IOD is expected to abate by the end of November. We have now reached the El Niño threshold and there is a 70% chance that it will persist but it seems to be a weak version and unlikely to have much effect on our rainfall. There are prospects for some more moisture sources as a result of a positive Southern Annular Mode (SAM) which is expected to bring a wetter than average December for eastern Victoria. Additionally, the Coral Sea is warmer than normal, providing a potential moisture source for eastern Australia. Most of the climate models forecast average rainfall over summer but model accuracy is low at this time of the year.



Julie is survived by husband John, sons Anthony and Travis, daughter in-law Bec, grandsons Max and Alex.



Last year the CERT had a record 50 callouts. We were unavailable for 5 of these. Our Average response time was 16 minutes with minimum of 3 minutes and a maximum of 26 minutes.

SUMMER HEALTH & SAFETY

Snake Bite

My annual summer advice on what to do if you suspect snake bite;

Call 000

Treatment is pressure bandaging and immobilisation.

Venom of Australian snakes moves through the lymph system which in turn relies on muscle activity in the limb for effective flow. Immobilising the limb and applying a constrictive bandage impedes snake venom flow through the lymph system. Apply a firm bandage over the site and up the limb - from fingers or toes up as far as you can go. The bandage must be tight without stopping circulation to the limb.

Remove any jewellery on the affected limb.

Mark the bandaged limb approximately where the bite location is to assist with later swabbing and venom identification. A cut can be made in that part of the bandage and the bite swabbed without any other part of the bandage being disturbed.

Keep the person very still, splint the limb if possible. If practical, position the patient in a legs-down position, semi-recumbent or (where an upper limb is affected) with the arm slung downward to the side of the body. Attempt to keep the bite in a position below the heart at all times, thus using gravity to assist with slowing the spread of venom to the central circulation.

Stay with the person and check circulation to fingers and toes. Take note of the time the bandage was applied. It may be easier to apply the bandage over clothes rather than trying to remove them.

Do NOT wash the bite, cut the bite, apply a tourniquet or try to catch the snake.

On hot days

- Drink water, even if you don't feel thirsty. Take a bottle with you always.
- Hot cars kill. Never leave kids, older people or pets in cars. The temperature inside a parked car can double within minutes.

- Keep cool. Seek out air-conditioned buildings, draw your blinds, use a fan, take cool showers and dress in light and loose clothing made from natural fabrics.
- Plan ahead. Schedule activities in the coolest part of the day and avoid exercising in the heat. If you must go out, wear a hat and sunscreen and take a bottle of water with you.
- Check in on others. Look after those most at risk in the heat – your neighbour living alone, the elderly, the young, people with a medical condition and don't forget your pets.

Please drive safely over the holiday period. On long drives take a break every two hours

ROADSIDE FUEL REDUCTION

The Brigade has sprayed the roadsides in the past 4 months in an effort to minimize the fuel load along various roads in and around Bethanga and Bellbridge.

CFA FIRE RESTRICTIONS 29th OCTOBER

Fire restrictions for the Towong Council came into force on of the 29th October, which was an entire month earlier than last year's fire restrictions.

When fire restrictions are in force, you must adhere to the restrictions listed in the CFA "Can I Can't I" brochure (which can be found at <u>https://www.cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/can</u>). Fires that do not comply with the rules or accidentally escape are viewed very seriously by Police.

COUNCIL FIRE RESTRICTIONS FOR OPEN FIRES

RESIDENTIAL ZONES- Towong Shire Council encourages residents to not light open fires within council defined residential zones and to use waste transfer stations and hard waste collections instead. No permits to burn will be issued for these zones.

TOWNSHIP ZONES - Permits to Burn in a Township Zone will be considered on a case by case basis.

RURAL LIVING ZONES - (Farmlets/Hobby farms) Residents will require a council permit to burn anytime (during and outside the fire danger period).

RURAL ACTIVITY ZONES & RURAL FARM ZONES - (Agriculture) Residents do not require a permit to burn outside the fire danger period but do require a permit to burn in the fire danger period.

If you are unsure, it is important to check with council which zone your property is in.



THIS FIRE SEASON: PREPARING YOUR PROPERTY This winter and spring has seen very little rain, leaving our bush and paddocks very dry. Fire restrictions have come in early and we have already seen a number of fires this season. This summer will be long and one of high fire danger.

It is very important this year to be well prepared by doing the following.

- Stay alert to the current and predicted weather conditions.
- Keep the grass short (below 100mm/4") for a good distance around your property
- Remove any flammable materials lying around.
- Check your fire fighting equipment for serviceability.

- Look around and assess your individual fire risks and discuss with your family and neighbours about what you are going to do if there is a fire. (This is a basic fire plan).

- Clean out the gutters, and keep them clean.
- Check your Gas Barbeque equipment for leaks.




