NBN COMING TO BETHANGA?

The Towong Shire has received a Planning Application to install a 30 metre high monopole NBN tower located off Flagstaff Rd, Bethanga. The following information is summarised by the editors of *Berringa Community News* from the Planning Report for Proposed Fixed Wireless Facility prepared on behalf of NBN Co Limited by Visionstream.

NBN Co and the National Broadband Network

The NBN is an upgrade to Australia's existing telecommunications network. It is designed to provide Australian's with access to fast, affordable and reliable internet and land line phone services. NBN Co plans to upgrade the existing telecommunications network in the most cost-efficient way using best-fit technology and taking into consideration existing infrastructure.

The NBN's fixed wireless network will use cellular technology to transmit signals to and from a small antenna fixed on the outside of a home or business, which is pointed directly towards the fixed wireless facility.

NBN Co's fixed wireless network is designed to offer service providers with wholesale access speeds of up to 25M bps for downloads and 5M bps for uploads. (NBN Co is designing the NBN to provide these speeds to our wholesale customers, telephone and internet service providers. End user experience including the speeds actually achieved over the NBN depends on some factors outside NBN Co's control like equipment quality, software, broadband plans and how the end user's service provider designs its network).

What is Fixed Wireless and how is it different to Mobile Broadband?

The NBN's fixed wireless network is engineered to deliver services to a fixed number of premises within each coverage area. This means that the bandwidth per household is designed to be more consistent than mobile wireless, even in peak times of use. Unlike a mobile wireless service, where speeds can be affected by the number of people moving into and out of the area, the speed available in a fixed wireless network is designed to remain relatively steady.

Site Selection of the Tower

NBN Co considers that the proposed facility (comprising a 30 metre high monopole structure with attached antennas

and equipment shelter) has been sited in the most appropriate location whilst ensuring adequate coverage is achieved.

One of the many factors that are considered by NBN Co in determining their preferred sites for NBN wireless facilities, is the amenity of the surrounding area. The proposed tower has been setback from the edge of the spur that extends towards Bethanga to provide some screening. It is also sited adjacent to the location of an unbuilt telecommunications facility that had previously been approved, but for which planning permission has now expired.

Furthermore, it has to be appreciated that facilities of this nature are necessarily visible as they need to be tall enough (and consequently visible) to serve their purpose of providing coverage into the local area.

- The site provides sufficient spatial separation from sensitive land uses with the nearest dwellings located almost 700 metres from the proposed site.
- The facility has been sited outside of the area affected by the Towong Shire Planning Scheme Significant Landscape Overlay.
- The facility has been sited to utilise to the maximum extent achievable, screening from the topography.
- The facility is designed so as not to compromise any significant views or places of significance or local landmarks; and
- The height and design of the proposed tower is considered to be the minimum required to achieve reasonable Radio Frequency (RF) objectives.

Radiofrequency Emissions

In relation to public safety and specifically Electromagnetic Emissions (EME) and public health, NBN Co operates within the operational standards set by the Australian Communication and Media Authority (ACMA) and Australian Radiation Protection and Nuclear Safety Agency (ARPANSA). ARPANSA is a Federal Government agency incorporated under the Health and Ageing portfolio and is charged with the responsibility for protecting the health and safety of both people and the environment from the harmful effects of radiation (ionising and non-ionising). All NBN Co installations are designed and certified by qualified professionals in accordance with all relevant Australian Standards. This helps to ensure that the NBN Co facility does not result in any increase in the level of risk to the public.

The following letter was received by the Berringa Community News on 21 August 2015:

We should be the envy of other regional communities...

Dear fellow residents of Bethanga,

We all want to have better broadband in our community - however the NBN's proposal to use fixed wireless technology, rather than roll-out the fibre-optic connection which is right at our fingertips in the village, is very surprising indeed.

The Better Broadband for Bethanga group (www.bethanga.com.au) has been created with the aim of achieving the best long-term solution for everyone involved. We view broadband as being a big asset to our homes and local businesses, and getting this right now, will result in long-term benefits.

At the public meeting on the 10th August, it was confirmed by the Telstra representative, that Bethanga's fibre-optic was of the right 'sort' to serve the whole community! We therefore have a great tool at our disposal to use – and we could be the envy of other regional communities if we simply make a case for what is best for Bethanga – rather than what is easiest or most expedient for NBN's contractors.

Our reasoning for opposing the fixed wireless tower (FW)¹, in favour of optic fibre technology known as fibre to the node (FTTN)², comes from the following research:

- 1. The tower will not serve everyone in our hilly area due to its 'line of sight' technology. Some will benefit from their proposed service, some however, will not.
- 2. The tower is affected by weather and so will not be consistently reliable.
- 3. The tower will result in a slower solution, in terms of uploading and downloading data.
- 4. The tower itself is right next to a conservation area.
- 5. The tower is an unsightly blight on a picturesque, unblemished hillside.

We think that this is a baffling proposal by the NBN, and is potentially missing a real opportunity for everyone in Bethanga. Why not use the resources we have, and attract businesses and future residents without building 'second-rate' structures? This could be a real draw card for Bethanga and give it the future capacity it needs, as well as providing improvements right now.

Many people all across Australia also believe that the FW towers are 'false economy' and are spoiling the countryside. Many communities have successfully overturned proposals that didn't suit their environment.

By contrast, fibre-optic technology only appears to have positives:

It is faster, more reliable, not an eyesore and will not affect conservation areas.

It could be a 'win-win' situation for the whole community.

For those who naysay and talk about the costs being prohibitive – apparently our situation is not dissimilar to those in more urban areas. In fact, the vast majority of the country will have fibre-to-the node, so we are not asking for anything unusual or special. The hard part, (getting the fibre here), has already been done, and with VDSL equipment into the exchange, in place of the current ADSL, we can have a 'true' broadband service.

We would like to ensure that the right technology is used for the right environment and we hope you will support us in asking the NBN for a better proposal than what is currently on offer. Let's not be 'cheap' with Bethanga's infrastructure – it is after all, our future.

And finally, there has been much confusion over this broadband NBN tower and the subject of mobile phone reception. Telstra are committed to building a smaller mobile phone tower for Bethanga whether or not this NBN tower goes ahead. Rejecting the NBN tower is not rejecting better mobile coverage.

In response to this letter, *Berringa Community News* contacted Michael Moore from NBN on 24 August 2015, about some of the issues raised.

BCN What are the costs of Fibre-To-The-Node versus Fixed Wireless for Bethanga?

NBN Even with an existing fibre optic connection to Bethanga, the cost of installing FTTN to all residences in a sparsely spread community such as Bethanga would be prohibitive and take a long time. The cost and time factors mean that FTTN will mainly be installed in the capital cities and large rural cities. Most rural communities will be FW or satellite.

BCN Will the weather conditions affect the service?

NBN No, the bandwidth of the signal means that only in exceptional weather, for example, a cyclone, is the signal affected. It is not like the internet services provided through current mobile phone services or digital TV services that are impacted by heavy rain.

BCN Will everyone in Bethanga be able to get FW service?

NBN No, the service does rely on 'line of sight' technology. Some residences are located in a signal shadow but we have located the proposed tower and set the height to maximise coverage. Those that cannot access FW. can access NBN Satellite.

BCN Is uploading and downloading data on FW slower than FTTN?

NBN Yes, but we consider downloads of up to 25M bps and 5M bps for uploads will enable users to do most of what they want to do including watching TV and movies on line.

BCN The satellite service is very slow at times.

NBN NBN shares satellites at the moment and the service can be inconsistent. NBN is launching its own satellite next month and this should improve the service.

CATHY McGOWAN VISITS TALGARNO

On Saturday 25 July, on her way to the Mitta Valley in her orange caravan, Cathy McGowan, Federal Member for Indi, began the day with a community meeting at Talgarno Hall. FifteenTalgarno residents attended to talk about telecommunications, schooling, transport and the special social issues of being a spill over from Albury-Wodonga.

Cathy encouraged the residents to write or email her with their concerns as she then brings them to the attention of appropriate ministers or government department. In any correspondence, it is important to state what actions you want taken as protocol requires government departments and ministers to respond to your request.

Cathy urged residents who experience mobile phone blackspots to nominate them with the Government's Mobile Phone Coverage Programme. It's important that Government has extensive data on the blackspot problem to guide decision-making on allocating the \$100 million that has been committed to improve phone coverage in parts of the country. Blackspots can be nominated by email at mobilecoverage@communications.gov.au or by phoning 1800 113 486.

Cathy is also invited people to contact her office to provide their blackspot information so it can be passed on to the Mobile Coverage Programme.

Vale Murrie Sinclair Through his life his father supported



Murrie Sinclair was born and grew up in and around the suburb of Preston, Melbourne in 1937 into a close-knit family. His sister lives to this day in the same house Murrie grew up in, with a grand-child and great grand-children living downstairs. Grand-parents living upstairs have always been the way in that household, from the time I can remember.

As a young man, on finishing high school, Murrie soon started to pull the threads of his life together. He volunteered for National Service as an eighteen year old and was accepted a couple of years later into the Army. He trained as a school teacher and, on obtaining his teaching certificate, he started teaching in country towns around Victoria, including some oneteacher schools. He met his wife to be, Dolly and they married in 1962 in Melbourne, moving to Dolly's parents' strawberry farm in Toowoomba. His two sons Mark and I (Matthew) were born there and Murrie joined the Army as an Officer, with his teaching skills on offer.

In these early years Murrie was also an enthusiastic and skilled mechanic and he had already restored several old Jags for resale. His skills and knowledge of cars and things mechanical would continue to develop over the years.

Vietnam also beckoned in the early days of his Army career - a topic he shared with his soldier mates but never talked about too much at home.

Murrie took on many of the Sinclair family values - the generosity and compassion for others shown by his father and the importance of gaining skills and getting a steady job - his father was in the railways for 50 years. These were the wartime values of his family.

him financially when he could, and also as a father. This support was to be passed on by Murrie to various family and friends throughout his life. Murrie was generous with his time and skills - something he continued to giveand enjoy into his retirement years and was an important part of his life in the Bethanga community. He enjoyed many a project and argument with his great mate Peter, Dolly's brother. Peter and his family were to provide great support to Murrie in his later years, especiallyafter Dolly passed away in the early nineties.

His teaching career in the Army progressed and he had responsibilities in leadership roles in Education Training Centres around the country, including Bandiana, Brisbane, Point Cook and in Papua New Guinea.

My first memories with him were of growing up in Wodonga. His way of sharing time with his kids was always around activities - kicking a footy (not much of a kick - he was more a baseballer in his day), games of chess and draughts, cards, monopoly... anything. He provided a secure and carefree life for his kids.

Like many of the era, he loved a long driving holiday, sometimes with a caravan in tow and the family travelled when the opportunity arose, through the islands around New Guinea and throughout Queensland.

Murrie always had a fascination for not only how things worked, how to fix them and their history - the cars, trains, planes and machinery - but also the places he lived. While he had an encyclopaedic knowledge of things mechanical, there was also an abiding interest in politics, both federal and local. Many in Bethanga would attest to some of his involvements and opinions on local politics.

In all, Murrie was a man who valued and loved his family life and in turn was loved by us. The passing away of Mark and Dolly by the early nineties meant Murrie wasn't going off to Queensland for his grey nomad days, although he and Dolly did manage one trip to Queensland in theold bus. He had brought the family back to Wodonga and settled in Bethanga in the early eighties, initially in Armstrong Street. Setting himself up in a small country town in Victoria was a return to the surrounds of his early teaching days. He embraced the life and the community of Bethanga.

Murrie set himself up for retirement in Bethanga. He eventually bought the mud-brick house on Springdale Road -really he bought the shed and the house came with it - he was a bit unclear on how many bedrooms it had. His later years in Bethanga were spent helping out others and doing what he loved most - arguing the toss with his mates and working in the shed.

He voted with his feet by choosing to remain in Bethanga where he felt most comfortable. I hope and feel the community here embraced him in turn and appreciated him as he did them - this will have been a great comfort to him over the last period of his life.

I thank the community on behalf of Murrie and myself - in addition to his loyal family and his great mates - not only those who have stayed in his life but also those who have passed through it. Murrie died suddenly and painlessly aged 78 - a life to be celebrated.



Gosh the days are warming up, how exciting...!!

I've noticed that my quince is ready to burst into life and all the deciduous trees are ready to do their thing...

Time to

- mulch your garden beds for spring/summer to keep all that moisture in the soil.
- feed your citrus with a good nitrogen feed when finished fruiting.
- prune citrus after all frosts.
- create a mini hothouse over a garden bed with some stakes and plastic, to get things started
- make a gorgeous new compost ... and keep making it up to feed your hungry summer
- do some housekeeping for your worms clean out and freshen up on a nice day.
- prepare any planting holes for future trees with compost, fertiliser and some good organic matter and mulch, so your tree can have the best start. It really does make all the difference.
- think about fertilising all your plants over the next couple of months....
- spot spray weeds with a solution of equal parts of water and brown vinegar.
- prune back salvias and perennials for a spring flush
- finish pruning roses
- Start your FRUIT FLY regime... Fruit Fly often overwinter in citrus and other plants, so as soon as it starts to warm up they are out and about. I am starting with the CERA Trap (traps males and females) that you can get from nurseries and I will look at netting my

tomatoes etc..... DON'T get complacent, they are waiting!!!

Time to plant

- seeds of tomatoes, capsicum, eggplant, etc. Keep them in a warm spot until the weather warms up a bit more.
- the last of any deciduous trees.

Note: Hold off planting any seedlings for summer crops at the moment, as it really is too cold and plants just don't do well.

Time to eat

- broccoli
- cauli
- all salad greens
- citrus
- rhubarb
- asparagus (just starting)

I have decided that crepe myrtle trees are my favourite at the moment.

They are tough and hardy, come in beautiful colours and there are lots of sizes and shapes to suit just about any situation...anyway I bought about 7 and have dotted them everywhere. Don't be surprised to see every kind at my place in the future!


Prospects for the Season Ahead

Thank you to Greg Hayes who has agreed to regularly contribute weather related articles for Berringa Community News readers.



Rainfall Round-up

The winter rainfall (May to end July) was 178 mm, a bit below average (203 mm). The rainfall for both May and June was about average while July was well below average.



The Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) forecast for winter was a bit optimistic for our district. The BOM suggested rainfall would be above the median 189 mm and we received 178 mm. I had suggested the most likely total was around 240 mm but that was much too hopeful.

The timing of the rain was again really favourable for us as we seemed to get a bit each time it was needed. The winter rainfall has been followed by good falls in early August, so our soil moisture level is good with excellent runoff into farm dams. Compared with most other parts of Victoria and southern NSW, we are in good shape.

Prospects for spring (August through October)

The El Niño that started this winter is now fully established and is expected to remain beyond autumn next year, whereas normally an event would end by then. The temperature of the central and western Pacific Ocean is well above the El Niño threshold making this event a moderate to strong El Niño. However, as mentioned in the last newsletter, the warmer than normal waters of the Indian Ocean have so far balanced the effect of the El Niño, so our rainfall in winter was close to average.

Largely because of the continuing effect of the warm Indian Ocean offsetting the El Niño, BOM and most other forecasters expect the rainfall over the next three months will be average or only slightly below the median for our part of the world.

The median rainfall for spring is 195 mm so the

forecast rainfall is around 190 mm. The average rainfall is 206 mm for this period.

It is expected that maximum temperatures over the forecast period will be about average and minimum temperatures a bit above average, which should help pasture growth.

Given the good soil moisture right now and an average rainfall forecast, it seems likely that we might still end up with an average spring. There is, however, some concern that the Indian Ocean Dipole

(IOD) will move from neutral to positive which could mean a drier spring.

Consequently, it might be worthwhile planning for a possible early finish to spring and that might mean cutting silage earlier (when the quality is better but volume less), not relying as much on hay and taking advantage of the wonderful cattle prices.



Home Alone

I was home alone one weekend recently and as I climbed the ladder to clean out a tank filter I reflected on how risky my actions were. If I had fallen and injured myself I could have been there for a couple of days before I could get help. I was some distance from the house and I did not have my mobile phone (not that it would have helped as there is no reception). Even if someone dropped in they may not have realised I was there unless they observed that my car was there and so were my dogs. I cannot guarantee that my Jack Russells would be like Lassie or Skippy and lead the visitor to me or just bark furiously as usual.

My thoughts on the risks of living alone were heightened by the recent sad death of a local resident who passed away alone at home and who wasn't found for some time.

As neighbors and friends of people living alone or people who are home alone for extended periods, being observant could save a life. Changes in normal patterns, for example uncollected mail, lights not coming on or going off, fires not being lit, pets behaving differently - continuous barking or wandering, the person not being seen where they would expect to be seen, unanswered phone calls may be worth investigating. An "are you OK?" visit, a call to family or

a call to Nev at the local police station could help save a life or avoid pain and suffering.

In this area we also have many people who work alone, particularly farmers working with machinery and animals. CERT has been called to farm accidents where a mobile phone or someone investigating why the farmer has not returned at the expected time has saved lives or reduced pain and suffering.

For those alone consider the safety risks involved in activities – call a neighbour, friends or family to help, carry a mobile phone, ensure neighbours and family know you are home alone, give neighbours and friends family members phone numbers, consider a medical alert alarm if you have health issues. For friends or family of those living alone ensure neighbours have your contact details. If you working alone, particularly with machinery or animals make sure someone knows where you going and what time you will return.

Rather than thinking that's odd and passing by, check it out.

BETHANGA RECREATION RESERVE

Back to Bethanga League Carnival

It's been a busy winter at Bethanga Recreation Reserve with another successful 'Back to Bethanga' football and netball match. The event was held in the final week of May. It was fantastic to see so many locals and visitors enjoying this growing annual event. Congratulations to Tallangatta for coming out on top at the final whistle. The Recreation Reserve Committee is very grateful to our sponsors for their donations to the raffle. We look forward to 2016 when we hope that this event will bring more families to the Reserve.

Local Landscape Enhancement Grant

Visitors to the Reserve will see some of the new developments that are a part of our 'Pizzas, Ponds & Paths' project. In April we began earth-works to improve the drainage of the Reserve, including removing the cattle grid at the entrance road and installing a new culvert. Works also included construction of a small bio-swale on the far side of the oval. This bio-swale will become a small wetland in winter and spring providing habitat for frogs, birds and aquatic animals. We were very lucky to have the support of Bethanga Landcare Group on National Tree Day who assisted with the planting of native wetland plants, trees and shrubs along the bio-swale.



July was also very busy with the construction of a new horse paddock on the southern side of the Reserve. The paddock aims to provide the Bethanga community with extra horse agistment options and help us to manage the southern end of the Reserve. The first construction phase of our outdoor catering area also started. Over 100 m² of concrete was laid under the pavilion verandah, next to the pizza oven. The tree stump adjacent to the tennis courts was also removed to make way for a new picnic shelter, which will eventually have new seating, bench space, additional lighting and an outdoor sink. One of the last jobs funded by the grant will be to install a walking path from the oval ring road up to the bridge over the creek. Path installation will begin in spring. We would like to acknowledge and thank the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) for





funding these works and for their ongoing support of the project. We are working very hard to complete all works in time for the SR500 Motor Cycle Club National Rally in late November.

Hazard reduction burn in Bethanga Creek and formation of a Friends Group

In April, the Recreation Reserve Committee hosted a DELWP community consultation meeting about the planned hazard reduction burn for the section of Bethanga Creek adjacent to the Reserve. The meeting provided information to local residents about plans



to burn a section of the creek as part of DELWP's Fire Operations Plan. The burn was planned for autumn, but was delayed as environmental conditions weren't right. We will make every effort to advise the Bethanga community when we receive confirmation from DELWP of the revised timing of the burn. In the meantime, the Bethanga Recreation Reserve Committee will support the establishment of a 'Friends of Bethanga Creek' group. This group will aim to undertake works to increase the biodiversity values of Bethanga Creek. The first stage of this project kicked off in January when we sprayed the blackberry. With the assistance of the Bethanga CFA we will conduct a fuel reduction burn in a section of the creek, upstream of the entrance road.

Finally, the Bethanga Recreation Reserve has made the transition to social media. We have started a Facebook page. We've been really pleased with the interest and support from the local community for the activities and developments at the Reserve. It is so easy to be complacent and a little thought before commencing a job can avoid losing control of the situation. However, if a fire gets out of your control during **any time of the year** causing damage to someone else's property, you are liable and the Police will investigate.

BELLBRIDGE HYDRANTS

The Brigade will be conducting our biannual serviceability check of the Bellbridge hydrants in early September. We will be inspecting and cleaning the hydrants and replacing any missing blue reflectors. If you see us, come and have a chat.

BRIGADE PREPAREDNESS

The Brigade will be carrying out roadside fuel reduction burns as needed on the roads mainly west of the Bethanga township nearer to the commencement of the Fire Season. This reduces the likelihood of random fires and provides excellent training for Brigade members.

SPRING CLEANING

Some spring jobs that will reduce the fire danger for your property this summer include:

- Clean out the gutters and keep them clean.
- Keep the grass short around the house and buildings.
- Remove any flammable rubbish lying around.
- Check your firefighting equipment for serviceability.
- Look around and assess your individual fire risks and discuss with your family and neighbours about what you are going to do if there is a fire. (This is a Basic Fire Plan).
- Check your gas BBQ equipment for leaks.

BETHANGA CREEK

The BBQ concluded at 7pm and we were then ushered into the Boat Club by our President, Roger Barrows.
Roger introduced Victor and explained that we were to hear him speak of his

passion, raptors, and in particular the birds of prey around Lake Hume. A good looking rooster himself, Victor kept us enthralled for around 90 minutes with a presentation liberally sprinkled with sharp wit, amazing facts about the many birds of prey that can be seen in our area, like the majestic sea eagles, peregrine falcons, nankeen kestrels and hawks and an amazing photo of a nesting Falcon. For those of you not there on the night it was a photo of a Ford Falcon stuck high in the branches of a tree!



We learned that in order for these beautiful predators to survive, they need to feed on smaller birds and these smaller birds require a rich and diverse environment of native woodlands and scrub to breed. This application involves the upgrade of the Granya Invasive Animal Exclusion Fence for the mutual benefit of the region's agriculture and native flora and fauna. When upgraded and working to its full potential, the fence will efficiently exclude feral pigs, foxes and wild dogs from farmland,

protect livestock from death and/or injury, and importantly preserve our native fauna, particularly marsupials in the Mt Granya State Park and the Jarvis Creek Plateau Regional Park. A key component of the project will be the application of mobile phone technology to monitor the electrical charge in the fence.


