70th Anniversary of Bethanga and District Rural Fire Brigade

On Sunday 27 September 2015, the Bethanga Brigade celebrated the 70th Anniversary of its' affiliation with the Country Fire Authority, and coincidentally, the 77th Anniversary of the foundation of the Bethanga Bush Fire Brigade. The function was held at the Bethanga Soldiers' Memorial Hall and was attended by a large number of Brigade members and their Families.

The President, Jim Jefferies, opened proceedings at 2pm by welcoming Councillor Aaron Scales, Deputy Mayor of Towong Shire, and District 24 Operations Officer Mark Owens from Wodonga. Other distinguished visitors included Tallangatta Group Officer Max Wood, Deputy Group Officer (Retd) Graeme Redman, and Talgarno Brigade Captain Peter Star.

Ron Evans, in the role of Brigade historian, presented an interesting anecdotal account of the Brigade's formation and its early activities which was enlivened by his reference to many of our predecessors. This talk set the scene for the rest of the afternoon.

Councillor Aaron Scales spoke to the assembly on the importance of volunteerism within the rural communities, and stressed the essential nature of the CFA Brigades within the Shire.

Operations Officer Mark Owens outlined the changed nature of the new CFA Service Awards which now recognise Active and Efficient Service.

A total of 61 Awards were presented to Brigade members, ranging from 5 year certificates to a medal and 70 year clasp to Leo Packer.

Councillor Aaron Scales presented Certificates of Appreciation to Robin Nielsen and Mary Northey, and a certificate of Brigade Life Membership to ex- Captain Bob Martin. Aaron then commended John Northey for his extensive and valuable Brigade and Community work.

John Northey thanked Councillor Aaron Scales, Mark Owens and the other visitors for attending. Jim Jefferies asked members Leo Packer (70 years), and Sarah Jones (40 days) to cut the birthday cake, and that concluded the formalities.

Berringa Community Centre Open for Business

If you have attended the Berringa Community Centre recently you will have noticed the renovations to the Centre – double glass doors installed at the east end, childrens' hand basin and toilets at the south end, child protection fencing and tasteful landscaping outdoors. The renovations have made the Centre a most attractive venue for community events for all age groups.

However, at the most recent Peninsula Neighbourhood Watch Community Meeting and Christmas dinner held at the Berringa Community Centre concern was expressed in regard to the availability of the facility for community functions and/or meetings. The secretary of Peninsula Neighbourhood Watch was asked to write to the CEO of Towong Shire seeking clarification of the usage and availability of the Centre for community functions and/or meetings.

The following information has been the response provided from the Shire office.

Peninsula community groups are encouraged to make use of the Berringa Community Centre as a local venue for meetings and events.

"We wish to assure any who may be concerned that the Berringa Community

Centre is certainly available for bookings from community groups," said Cr David Wortmann, Towong Shire Council Mayor.

"To address a key priority identified for families in the Peninsula area, the recent works at the Centre have focused on kindergarten and childcare requirements," explained Cr Wortmann. "However the Centre is still an attractive venue that is available to the wider community," he said.

With just a handful of bookings made over the past four years for the Berringa Community Centre, Council supports increased use of this valuable community asset by all members of the broader Peninsula community, including families with young children, community groups and other community members. Bookings can be made by contacting Council on 02 6071 5100.

It is pleasing that the use of the Berringa Community Centre has been increased with kindergarten and young children sessions. There are many community groups in the Peninsula area, so when possible we should maximise the use of this valuable facility.

NBN? Yes but maybe not

At the Towong Shire Council meeting on 8 September the NBN tower proposal for Bethanga was considered. There were a total of 12 objections from 16 people. The grounds for objection were summarised as follows:

- Health concerns relating to electromagnetic energy emissions
- Insufficient community consultation
- The disturbance of views and vistas
- The tower will be too high
- The land owner does not live on the property where the tower will be sited
- Adequate internet connection already exists
- The potential impact on property values;
- Aboriginal cultural heritage concerns
- Spoiling the rural atmosphere
- Better uses for the money to be spent
- The proximity of the tower to the School
- The tower will increase insurance premiums
- Miscommunication in the town, some residents think it is a tower for mobile phone coverage
- Future moral regrets and legal litigation on the people considering the application
- The health risk to livestock
- The tower will be a blight on the landscape
- Other solutions are available.

A petition with 14 signatures objecting to the application was also submitted to Council. Council also received a petition and several letters of support in favour of the proposal. A total number of 107 people signed the petition in favour, asking Council to grant a permit.

Other correspondence received included 17 letters of support from 22 people. The grounds for support were as follows:

- The effect on the landscape will be minimal
- Access to high speed internet is a requirement in the 21st Century
- The beneficial effect to quality of life
- Current access to the internet is inadequate
- The landscape won't lose its rural charm
- Property prices will appreciate with the new access to high speed internet
- People will be enabled to work remotely or from home, thus increasing the economic capability of the area
- The electromagnetic energy that will be emitted is well below the allowed limits
- A tower is the most cost effective means by which to provide access to high speed internet
- Children are unable to do homework with current speeds being too slow for internet based programs
- Opponents to the tower are far outnumbered by the silent majority who want the NBN
- Tech savvy people will move into the Shire.

Council considered all the matters required under section 60 of the Planning and Environment act 1987 and granted a permit under the relevant provisions of the Towong Planning Scheme with the following conditions:

- The power route must be carried out in accordance with the approved endorsed plans.
- The external finishes of the tower and associated buildings and structures, including fences, must be in nonreflective neutral "earthy" tones and colours
- A planted landscape screen must be established around the perimeter of the approved compound area. The landscaping must be maintained for the life of the approved use and development.
- The monitoring of electromagnetic emissions by the applicant with the results provided to council on a twice yearly basis for the first three years of the operation of the facility.

The above was summarised from Minutes of Towong Shire Council meeting on 8 September

After the meeting the Better Broadband for Bethanga group appealed the decision to VCAT (Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal)

Nik Palmer representing the Better Broadband for Bethanga issued the following Statement to Berringa Community News

As many are aware there was a decision to grant the planning application for an NBN tower in Bethanga. As a group of original objectors, we have decided to appeal this decision to VCAT. The initial hearing is set for April 2016.

The ALP have committed to reinstating their original plan of Fibre to the Premises should they be elected at the next Federal Election, which is a better solution for Bethanga. So even if the tower is granted a permit, the government might change the NBN plans again.

It's my opinion that the community have been deliberately misinformed about the potential benefits of this tower and its impact on the town and this will form part of our appeal at VCAT.

Nadja's Natter

This is my first foray into writing something for this newsletter, so I hope you'll enjoy my musings. Let me start by introducing myself, I'm Nadja, I live locally in Bethanga and I am very passionate about dressmaking.

Some of you may already know of me as a regular advertiser in this newsletter. Some of you have come to know me by becoming a valued customer. For those that don't know me, I specialise in making vintage clothing, particularly the 1950's era, but can make almost anything from historical costumes to bridal and evening wear.

My daughter, who is a bit of a drama queen, always has a themed birthday party every year. Her birthday falls just at Halloween, you can imagine some of the themes l've had to make costumes for! We've had Witches and Wizards, Legends of Rock, Fantasies and Fairytales, Zombies and Survivors, Stars of the Silver Screen and the Hens' Party to end all hen parties where the costumes were Moulin Rouge girls. I loved making them all. As these were for my daughter, who is now almost 29 (and I still can't say NO to her), I had to attend all of them in costume with my husband who complained bitterly, that he didn't want to go. Thankfully, she's now relocating to Perth for a job promotion, so no more parties, yay!

Vintage fashion, as you know, has made a huge comeback. Personally I think every woman should wear what they want for whatever occasion. This could be anything from that little black dress you've had for years and buried at the back of your wardrobe, but still feels like a million dollars when you wear it. There is still time to get 'mulching'. It's so important to try and keep as much moisture as you can in the soil and the soil profile is drying out quickly already. Pea straw, lucerne, other straws, compost, sugar cane mulch etc are all great, but a mix of a couple of them make a more nutritious mulch and soil feeder and conditioner all in one. Giving your plants a good bucket or two of liquid fertiliser like Charlie Carp, fish emulsions, or any organic combination before mulching is even better.

Another fantastic way to feed your plants quickly as well as adding another ingredient to your mulch/fertiliser, is by making your own compost/herb teas for your garden. Things to put in your compost tea-

- Chopped Comfrey leaves (I have some if you would like some)
- Yarrow
- Weeds- fleshy thistles, chickweed, stinging nettle, and heaps more (heaps more on Google)
- Different manures (make a hessian tea bag to put it in)
- Your own fantastic compost (hessian tea bag). If it's a great compost full of a diversity of ingredients, this is fabby on its own in a hessian tea bag
- Worm castings (in a hessian tea bag)
- You could add a splash of an organic liquid fertiliser
- Any mix or just one or two of these combinations can make a fabulous liquid addition for your soil and garden, keeping in mind this would be in conjunction with other fertilising methods throughout the year.

Put what ingredients you have in a large barrel, plastic garbage bin or similar, place in a spot that might get some arvo shade, fill it with water, throw everything in, put a VERY firm lid on (I will explain) and then 'wait' about 2 weeks, then 'voila' Compost Tea.

Dilute with water to a nice tea colour, then water in around the base and drip line of your plants. Make a weaker solution for seedlings.

WARNING. - This is probably the most revolting smelling, sometimes bubbling mixture you may ever make. But, it's amazing for your plants. So, perhaps keep it away from the house and be prepared....

I suggest some Googling as there is some great info out there on reputable websites.

Now I have to go and make another batch tomorrow, I'm inspired ... may need a peg!

Plant of the season -Ballerina Apple varieties .. Gorgeous full sized fruit, fabulous space savers, great for an informal screen/divider, wonderful to manage as far as pests and diseases etc ... netting. Mmm, well I may of just planted 5 in Spring , a bit of bias perhaps, but they are looking fabulous, full of fruit, and well, I just love 'em' ..



Don't forget to plant something tomorrow - just cause you can



Rainfall Round-up

The spring rainfall (August to end October) was 140 mm, a well below average (205 mm). The rainfall for August (94 mm) was well above average, September was half the average and October less than 25% of average. The period from September 4 to October 31 was exceptionally dry with only 13 mm of rain and this turned what looked like being a great spring into a really poor one.


The Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) forecast for winter was again optimistic for our district - BOM suggested rainfall would be about 190 mm and we received 140 mm. The big driver of the dry seems to have been the turnaround in the Indian Ocean with the Indian Ocean Dipole (IOD) moving sharply into a positive state that reinforced the already strongly negative El Niño. BOM did warn us that this was a possibility but I guess we all discounted it given the good soil moisture levels going into August.



Prospects for Summer (November to end January)

The El Niño has been established for six months and has been very strong, comparable to 1997/98 and 1982/83. It is expected to peak before the end of the year and then decline in 2016. The Indian Ocean remains very warm (hottest on record) creating the positive Indian Ocean Dipole that has reinforced the El Niño to give us our dry spring. The positive IOD normally breaks down in November as the monsoon season begins in the north, so this summer, our weather will be influenced mainly by the decaying but still strong El Niño and the warm Indian Ocean.

BOM expect the rainfall over the next three months will be below average in our district with only a 35-40% chance of exceeding the median rainfall of 159 mm. The recent rain has topped up the soil moisture from the very low levels it reached in late October so there is currently good pasture growth on the lower country and summer grasses on the hills are responding well. The big question will be (as always) when we get a reasonable autumn break. The long range Predictive



Ocean Atmosphere Model for Australia (POAMA) that BOM uses to predict central Pacific Ocean surface temperatures which drive the Southern Ocean Index (SOI) suggest it may be May before we are out of the full effect of the El Niño. Let's hope that this is not the case and that we get an early autumn break but it may be worth at least preparing for the possibility.

- When you first call Triple 000/112, you will be asked which service you require **Police**, **Fire** or **Ambulance**.
- You will then be connected to an **Emergency** Services Telecommunications Authority (ESTA) communications centre. Note: The exception to this is if you live in rural Victoria you will be connected to local/regional police force Victoria Police and to Rural Ambulance Victoria for ambulance services.
- The call taker will ask "Where is your emergency?" Followed by "What is your emergency?"

These are the two most important pieces of information you can give the call taker.

- ESTA's call taker's first goal is to get the address verified as soon as possible so that emergency services can be dispatched quickly.
- To confirm the location, ESTA's call taker will always ask where the nearest cross-street or intersection is. There are many streets in Victoria with the same name and many similar sounding suburbs, so this verification is important to get emergency services to the correct place.
- ESTA may continue to ask relevant questions and while doing so, an ESTA dispatcher is signalled via the computer aided system with the details which are then used to dispatch the police, fire or ambulance services. Any additional information you provide, the call taker will pass on to the already dispatched emergency service.

Each year there are thousands of nuisance and hoax calls to Triple 000/112. This type of call is a serious offence and may result in delayed response to someone in a real emergency situation. People making falsified and mischievous or hoax calls are prosecutable and can face gaol sentences.

Thinking about Volunteering

The Berringa Community News team was sorry to hear that the Bethanga Action Group and the Talgarno and District CWA have decided to call it a day. Neither group has been able to attract new members to keep the groups alive.

You only need to look at the Clubs and Groups section of the Berringa Community News to see how dependent our community is on volunteers to provide services, amenities and social activities that build a safer and resilient community.

As a committee member of several volunteer organisations I see how difficult it is to attract new members particularly to become involved in committees or in ongoing regular activities.

This is borne out by new ABS data that shows volunteering rates in Australia are declining for the first time in almost 20 years with 75 per cent of people surveyed saying they feel too rushed or pressed for time.

The report shows that in 2014, 31 per cent of Australians volunteered compared to 36 per cent just four years ago. The fall in volunteering mirrors a decline in community participation across the board generally, including sport and participation in special interest groups, such as politics and professional associations.

In rural communities we have an image of volunteering involving older community members but across Australia the highest rates of volunteering were for young people aged 15-17 years (42 per cent), those aged 35-44 years (39 per cent) and older people aged 65-74 years (35 per cent). Couples with children are more likely to have volunteered in the last 12 months (38 per cent) than couples without children (29 per cent) or people living alone (25 per cent). Given that the most common type of organisations that people volunteer for are sports and physical recreation organisations (31 per cent) this is not surprising.

It seems to be the norm in small communities that the same people are involved in a number of committees. In the last 20 years the number of people volunteering has increased but for less time than in the past. In 2014 Australians averaged 128 hours per volunteer in the last 12 months but almost 20 per cent of volunteers performed more than 200 hours of volunteering throughout the year.

The most commonly reported reasons for volunteering are to help others or the community (64 per cent), for personal satisfaction (57 per cent) or to do something.

As organisations we must come to terms with the changes

TALGARNO CFA

The Brigade held its pre-season General Meeting on 27 October, but we must have picked a bad time because not many were able to attend.

Some of the items that were raised and discussed were:

- BART registration (Pager message on mobile phone) – any member wishing to be included should contact BART Administrators (Greg Hayes or Hugh Dunchue).
- Helmet torches– contact Rob Medwell if you don't have one.

- Roadside burn planning for 2015 planning to burn roadside where breaks have been prepared were scheduled for either Sunday November 8 or 15 depending on conditions. The Brigade is keen to see a more strategic, long-term approach to burns with planning 12 months in advance.
- Listening sets/scanners CFA has arranged the purchase of these and the Brigade will purchase 8 at a subsidised cost of \$150 each.
- Training was held on 18 October in conjunction with the Tallangatta Group but disappointing participation. The following brigade training was on Thursday 19 November, at 7:00pm and <u>thereafter on the third Thursday of each month</u> during summer.
- 85th Anniversary The Brigade is considering a celebration of its 85th Anniversary in 2017 based on its formation as a bushfire brigade in 1932. It is also planning to have an Honour Board prepared with names of foundation members and Captains.
- Abandoned vehicles Members are asked to report these to Bethanga Police.
- Unauthorised fires and campfires during fire season – Members are advised to report these to VicFire rather than seeking to confront those responsible themselves.
- Replacement of Slip-on The Brigade was asked to carry out an analysis of the likely cost of replacing the Slip-on.
- Water points CFA have announced that there is money available to develop water points and the Brigade will investigate this opportunity.
- For the year to 30 June 2015, the Brigade earned \$9,000.68 with fund raising contributing \$4,257.05, grants \$2,080, donations \$1,200 and catering \$900 being the major items. Overall, the Brigade had a surplus of \$5,602.53. Fund raising through the BBQ generated \$2,010.41 or 36% of that surplus.

Summer is now here and it seems it is likely to be a long, hot and dry one, so landholders will need to be particularly vigilant and avoid taking any risks on hot days. Brigade members are asked to keep their pagers with them at all times and to respond to callouts and make sure that they get along to the training and have their firefighting gear in good order (contact Peter Star if you need replacements).

The monthly BBQ, held on the second Friday of the month, continues to be well supported and the profit from the October BBQ (\$250) was donated to *Berringa Community News* in return for their support to the Brigade. The application for the Liquor Licence is nearing completion.

INCIDENTS

25 September, 11:00am

8 members responded with both trucks to a Blackberry Burn off, that got out of control at Talgarno Gap Road. The owner of the property quickly had it back under control and the brigade returned with no action taken. Penalties imposed on the responsible person included 20 washing fire trucks.

29 September, 0:52am

Car fire, corner Talgarno Gap and Murray River Roads. 12 members responded in both trucks and private vehicle's to assist Talgarno Brigade.

The car was quickly extinguished and the brigade returned after a short time.

17 October, 10:27am

15 members responded in both trucks, slip on and two private vehicles to a burn off out of control in Yonson Road, Bethanga. The owner had the burn back in control when the brigade arrived and no action was taken.

OUT OFF CONTROL PRIVATE BURNS

The Brigade has been called to two of out of control burns in the past three months. In both instances, the owner got a scare when the fire intensity increased unexpectedly. It only takes a slight changes to fuels, weather or topography for a fire to escalate quickly and get out of control. You must have the means and capability ready at hand to extinguish any fire under your control. It's too late to get the water after the fire gets out of control.

ROADSIDE BURNING

As yet the Brigade has not completed any roadside burning. Our efforts have been focused on completing the burning of the creek in Bethanga. We have been working with Council to investigate alternative methods of fuel reduction on roadsides with promising results.

FIRE RESTRICTIONS

Fire Restrictions for Towong Shire came into force on the 26 October which is around one month early.

While fire restrictions are in force, you must adhere to the restrictions listed in the CFA "Can I Can't I" brochure. Fires that do not comply with the rules or accidentally escape are viewed very seriously by Police.

The Brigade updates the Fire Danger Signs at the Bethanga Bridge and the Bethanga Fire Station daily. This information is also available on the CFA web page: http://www. cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/ total-fire-bans-and-ratings/. The CFA website also provides downloads of information such as the "Can I Can't I" fire information brochure and the Mobile Phone "Fire Ready App" which provides info on fires in your selected area.

PROPERTY INSPECTIONS

Local Farmer Wins Landcare Victoria Award

Talgarno beef cattle farmer, Alan Stephenson won the Landcare Victoria 2015 DEDJTR Innovation in Sustainable Farm Practices Award, North East.

The grazing management system at "Goonibil", the Stephenson's 1,200 hectare property, is designed to maximise pasture growth and to protect and improve the property's soils and native pastures.

Most of the property is under native grass pastures. The Stephensons have undertaken considerable structural improvements to create approximately 50 paddocks based on land class. This assists with rapid, intense grazing of each paddock and long rest periods as part of the rotation system. A comprehensive stock watering system with solar pumping to strategic storage tanks and gravity feeding to troughs makes for a more flexible system.

Although the stocking rate is fairly low, according to Alan, the property is much more economical and enjoyable. The livestock and grazing management aims for 100 per cent ground cover at all times to eliminate soil erosion and to suppress annual weeds. Livestock numbers are adjusted to match the available feed reserves. This maximises groundcover, increases native grass growth and aims to ensure there is never a serious seasonal feed gap. The grazing management used on the property has significantly reduced pest management costs, including weeds and internal animal parasites.

Two thirds of the property is set aside for rehabilitation and preservation of native vegetation. These areas are managed to protect the native grasses and remnants of Grassy Box and dry forest woodlands with occasional, time specific grazing for environmental benefit. Almost all waterways and gullies on the property have been fenced and revegetated to protect and stabilise banks and protect water quality.

Alan is an active member of the Wises Creek Talgarno Landcare Group, hosting grazing management field days to help promote this management system to others. He has also been involved in dung beetle release projects on the property and bird and reptile monitoring which led to the sighting of a rare whip snake.
