# **Talgarno Recreation Reserve**

There has been some progress at last with developments at the Rec Reserve. Towong Shire has confirmed that it has secured funding for the BBQ shelter to be built between the fire shed and the hall. It has also obtained funding for a coin-operated electric BBQ with two hotplates and a sink. Tables and benches for the BBQ have also been secured. We are hoping that the shelter will be constructed before Christmas but that might be optimistic.

Our application to the Department of Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) for solar panels to go on the roof of the BBQ shelter has been approved.

Consultants appointed by the Towong Shire under Bushfire Recovery Victoria have been working with the Committee to develop a comprehensive list of improvements needed for the hall including new a/c units, upgrades to the kitchen and much more. The Berringa Peninsula Community Network has arranged for a grant writer to prepare an application for funding of these improvements, and we are working with them to finalise it shortly.

The tennis courts upgrade project is going ahead and further details of this will be shared as soon as we have them.

After decades of reliance on self-help, at last our Reserve is now getting some outside assistance.

The second stage of the Great River Road project is progressing well, with the creation of two new wayside stops – one about 2km from Bellbridge and the other at 641 Murray River Road. The civil works are nearly complete and on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> August, local community members joined the contractors (Vic Flow Civil) to plant out the wayside kerb with some native plants. It was an enjoyable session and many thanks to those who gave up their time to assist.

The sites will be completed once some information panels have been included at both sites and a sculpture at 641 Murray River Road. Community suggestions about what these panel boards could include and ideas about the sculptures are currently being sought. Through the Bushfire Recovery Victoria BPCN is supporting a grant application for improvements to the Bethanga, Granya and Talgarno Halls.

#### **Emergency Preparedness**

Over the past few months, we have been collecting local residents' views and priorities with regards to being prepared for future emergencies, such as bushfires. We have now compiled a report and sent it to the local fire brigades and the Towong Shire for consideration in their planning.

In a survey, residents ranked the resources needed in an emergency, with one being the most important to them and 10 being the least, as:

- 1. Better communication infrastructure (mobile network)
- 2. Alternative power sources for local halls/ community centres
- 3. Increased community water storage
- 4. Regular community meetings during a fire event
- 5. Frequently updated website with fire related information specific to the Peninsula region
- 6. Bushfire preparedness workshops
- 7. A clearly identifiable evacuation site for each township
- 8. Installation and use of water pump workshops
- 9. Assistance with preparing an escape plan
- **10.** Physical place with fire related information specific to the Peninsula region


# **Prospects for the Season Ahead**

Thank you to Greg Hayes who has agreed to regularly contribute weather related articles for Berringa Community News readers.



#### **Rainfall Round-up**

Winter turned out to be like it used to be – wet and muddy! In an average year the winter rainfall (May to end July) would be 202 mm. This year it was 259 mm at TAFCO station (De Hennin's), 277 mm at Hume Reservoir and 260 mm at my place.



After the exceptionally dry April, the rain in May was only average but picked up in June and really set in during July. June saw cold fronts moving across and bringing early snow to the higher parts. In July there was plenty of moisture to the north and regular cold fronts moving through bringing rain. The sub-tropical ridge of high pressure was further north than normal, so for a change we got the rain.

The temperatures over winter were average overall but there were some really cold days as early as May and then into June and July. Thankfully we missed out on the extreme winds and flooding rain that devastated southern Victoria during June.

Soil moisture conditions are much wetter than average at this time of year, setting things up for a really good spring.

By early July BOM declared that a negative Indian Ocean Dipole (IOD) had developed, helping to drive the wetter winter and likely extend into spring. BOM's outlook forecast for winter had been for average rainfall. In hindsight this was about right for May and June but an under-estimate for July.


# Prospects for Spring (September to end November)

The IOD is still negative and is expected to remain so until December so the warmer water off the northern Australian coast will supply good moisture sources, likely to lead to a wetter spring. There are some early indications (stronger easterly trade winds and warmer water temperatures in the Coral Sea) that a La Niña may develop in spring but it is too early to call.

Dale Grey reports that six of the 12 models he follows suggest wetter than average rainfall, three wetter to neutral and three neutral. The temperature outlooks are for five warmer than average, five neutral and one cooler.

The BOM outlook is similar with three of the seven models they use (including their own) predicting La Niña conditions and hence wetter than normal spring. They also suggest that the negative IOD will persist through to December.

It is very likely that we will have above average rainfall right through spring.

This is the most exciting time in the garden for me, the busiest and generally exhausting and exhilarating as well. Things are really starting to get a wriggle on out in the garden, with buds and blossoms opening daily.

There are so many different things that need to be done in the garden that I've decided to break it down into month-by-month garden tasks, etc.

#### September

- The soil is still quite cool at the moment, so try not to get too excited and start planting too far out of season.
- Seeds that can go in the ground now are: mixed lettuce/salad greens, beetroot, rocket, Asian greens, coriander, peasant potatoes.
- You could start some seeds of tomatoes, capsicum, basil, silverbeet, etc. if you have a place for them to germinate and keep warm glasshouse, cold frame, homemade job.
- Fruit fly baiting can start this month. Those little blighters are lurking, getting ready to ruin your fruit.
- As your fruit trees finish flowering, give them a good complete organic fertiliser to get them off to a strong start for spring.
- \* Get your compost and compost teas fired up this month so you have lots of organic matter and liquid fertiliser for spring.
- \* Getting rid of pesky weeds will be high on the agenda this month.
- \* Enjoy the sunny days.

#### October

- \* The soil is warming this month. Sow seeds into the ground: salad greens, lettuce, corn, cucumber, beans, potato, pumpkin.
- \* Seeds into the glasshouse: tomato, lettuce, broccoli, spring onion, basil.
- Now that it's starting to warm up, pests and diseases are things we need to keep an eye out for now.
- Pear and cherry slug will be starting to emerge now. Apply garden lime or organic products if infestations are too bad.
- \* Once fruit trees have completed flowering, net for fruit fly.
- Citrus are susceptible to scale and sooty mould. These little pains attract ants which just keep the cycle going. Try using a banding product to stop the ants making their way up the tree.

\* Get the last of your mulching done for the summer months.



#### November

- Well, we are hitting the hotter months now most of your veggies should be planted with the exception of salad greens, that can be planted out all year.
- \* Seeds in the soil: melons, pumpkin, sweet potato, corn, beetroot, radish, peas.
- Seeds into the glasshouse: spring onions, leeks, silverbeet, broccoli.
- Get some broccoli seedlings in the ground, along with some tomatoes, eggplant, capsicum and leeks and don't forget to put some cucumber seeds into the ground.
- Apply some potash to your fruiting plants like tomatoes, capsicum etc.
- It will also be time to deeply water your fruiting trees while the fruit is starting to grow.
- You may also want to net as many of your fruit trees as you can, to guard against birds and fruit fly.
- If you love producing more plants, then softwood cuttings can be taken. Make sure your mix is free draining and that they don't dry out.

Off to put more seeds in....

### Hard and Green Waste collection - 2021

# Bethanga - Stockpile site, Talgarno Gap Rd, east of CFA Shed Saturday 9 October - 10am to 1pm Granya - Stockpile site, south of Murray River Rd., Sunday 10 October - 10am to 1pm

Towong Shire will run a hard and green waste collection service at the following locations and times, on the dates shown below. Dumping of waste at the nominated sites outside the specified collection times is illegal and offenders will be prosecuted.

• We accept standard trailer or Ute loads of non commercial hard waste (couches, stoves, old fencing wire, timber, steel, glass, paper, plastic, nondecomposable, non-hazardous solid wastes) as well as non-commercial green waste (lawn clippings, branches up to 25 cm or 10 inch diameter).

• We do not accept mattresses, bed bases, batteries, tyres, LPG cylinders chemicals, oils, asbestos, paint tins

#### Have your say on upgrades to Roy Williams Park

As part of Towong Shire Council's *Our Bellbridge* Masterplan, Council is looking to continue the development of Roy Williams Park.

Following a community consultation process in 2018, draft plans were developed. These plans include upgrades to the tennis courts, picnic area, playground and skatepark, as well as new footpaths, additional seating, car parking and landscaping.

Towong Shire Council Mayor David Wortmann said the Council now wants to hear from the community to help prioritise the upgrades based on the available budget.

"The upgrades to Roy Williams Park will be completed in stages, with Stage 1 commencing later in 2021."

"We need help from the community to understand if the priorities are still the same and which upgrades are the highest priority," he said.

#### Towong Shire Council presents its Budget 2021/22

Towong Shire Council Mayor David Wortmann said the Council is pleased to present its Budget 2021/22 to residents and ratepayers of Towong Shire.

"As our communities continue to recover from the catastrophic bushfires of 2019/20 and the ongoing world-wide pandemic, this Budget provides the investment to support the growth and vibrancy of our Shire into the future," he said.

Highlights include a substantial \$25.5m capital works budget, supported by over \$13m in State and Federal grant funding. Key projects include:

• Commencement of Great River Road upgrades to develop its status as a premier touring route

• Completion of the Corryong CBD and Mitta Mitta streetscape upgrades

• Upgrade of the Corryong Stock Route to provide an alternative route for large trucks

Road, Yabba Road and Lake Road

• Further development of the High Country Rail Trail

• Continuation of upgrades at the Colac Colac Caravan Park

The Budget will also continue to support the services that our communities value, such as early years services, planning and building functions, and community and economic development programs.

Rates will increase by 1.5%, in line with Victoria's Fair Go Rates System which caps council rate increases in line with inflation.

The Mayor said that the Budget has been based on ongoing community consultation. "We always welcome your suggestions as to how we can make our Shire an ideal place to live," he said.

# In Memoríum

### Vale Brian (Tubby) Hunter

13/08/1955 - 26/08/2021



Tubby loved Bethanga- he considered the community his family. He worked in the Bethanga Hotel for 12 years with his lifelong friend Paul Chadwick who died last year. The Bethanga community was Tubby's family. The team want to thank Ambulance Victoria Tallangatta Branch, Frank and Jo, for transporting Tubby from palliative care to Bethanga Pub where he worked for 12 years for a farewell drink with his friends and a last pat of his dog.

Tubby died after a short illness.

# How do you know if someone is having a stroke? Think... F.A.S.T.

The Stroke Foundation recommends the F.A.S.T. test as an easy way to remember the most common signs of stroke. Using the F.A.S.T. test involves asking these simple questions:



Face Check their face. Has their mouth drooped?

Arms Can they lift both arms?

**Speech** Is their speech slurred? Do they understand you?

**Time** Is critical. If you see any of these signs, call 000 straight away.

# While you are waiting for the ambulance to arrive:

- If the person is conscious, lay them down on their side with their head slightly raised and supported.
- Do not give them anything to eat or drink.
- Loosen any restrictive clothing that could

cause breathing difficulties.

- If weakness is obvious in any limb, support it and avoid pulling on it when moving the person.
- If they are unconscious, check their breathing and pulse and put them on their side. If they do not have a pulse or are not breathing, start CPR straight away.
- If you are unsure how to perform CPR, the ambulance call taker will give instructions over the phone.

# The 000 call takers will ask you a number of questions

Are they completely awake? Are they breathing normally? Are they able to talk normally? Tell me why you think it's a stroke When was the last time they were acting normally?

Have they ever had a stroke before?

#### Other signs of stroke

Facial weakness, arm weakness and difficulty with speech are the most common symptoms or signs of stroke, but they are not the only signs.

The following signs of stroke may occur alone or in combination:

- Weakness or numbness or paralysis of the face, arm or leg on either or both sides of the body
- Difficulty speaking or understanding
- Dizziness, loss of balance or an unexplained fall
- Loss of vision, sudden blurring or decreased vision in one or both eyes
- Headache, usually severe and abrupt onset or unexplained change in the pattern of headaches
- Difficulty swallowing

Sometimes the signs disappear within a short time, such as a few minutes. When this happens, it may be a transient ischaemic attack (TIA). After a TIA, your risk of stroke is higher. Stroke can lead to death or disability. A TIA is a warning that you may have a stroke and an opportunity to prevent this from happening.

If you or someone else experiences the signs of stroke, no matter how long they last, call 000 immediately. Emergency medical treatment soon after symptoms begin improves the chance of survival and successful rehabilitation.

If you need assistance identifying what bio controls may be working for you call Simon Feillafe ph. 0438 190 999 who will be happy to assist you.

Our Dung Beetle project is still progressing and those with beetle tents are keenly awaiting beetles to appear. Beetles can also be seen working actively in your paddocks at present. Keep a keen eye on them and identify them.

The funding for the Talgarno Wetlands project has come through thanks to some great work by Greg Hayes and Simon Feillafe. This will be a great project for our group and a terrific asset for our community. We look forward to working with the school on this project. # Bethanga Landcare Tree Giveaway as popular as ever

Despite delays caused by earlier COVID lockdowns, the annual Bethanga Landcare Tree Giveaway once again proved popular this year on the week-end of 14-15th August.

Under stringent registration, social distancing and number restrictions, nearly 700 native tree and bush seedlings found new homes at 28 properties across Bethanga. Some of the hills and gardens of the township now look peppered by what appears to be early snowdrop blooms. Lo and behold! They are the hundreds of white milk cartons as tree guards handed out with the seedlings!

The white dots have also appeared along Bethanga Creek at the Recreation Reserve where a hundred seedlings were scattered as part of a restricted community planting. More seedlings will soon be handed over to Bethanga Primary School to be planted when restrictions are lifted.



On another note, a public presentation on bees and pollinating insects planned for late August at Bethanga Hall has unfortunately been postponed due to present partial lockdown restrictions. We hope to be able to reschedule it for later this year.

In the meantime, Bethanga Landcare volunteers are



proud to have given their time to the River Road project by planting native grasses along the new picturesque wayside stop on the Murray River Road at Bellbridge. Go and check it! The views of the bridge with the lake near capacity at this time of the year are stunning.

Nexus Minerals has started to do some investigations into Copper/Gold mining in the Bethanga area. This has consisted of walking around the area and making observations. The Nexus team has met with a number of local farmers to introduce themselves and have obtained landowner permission for access.

## Mitta to Murray Landcare

#### **Research Brings Hope for an Invasive Prickly Problem**

As the weather warms up and we start thinking about getting on top of our weeds, the issue of blackberry infestations is at the forefront of many Berringa locals' minds. Invasive European blackberries cost over \$103 million per year in lost production and control costs and have a detrimental impact on the environment, outcompeting native vegetation and harbouring pest animals.

Several years ago Mitta to Murray Landcare Inc. were fortunate to welcome Dr Raelene Kwong, Senior Research Scientist Biological Control on Invasive Species from Agriculture Victoria, as a member of the group. This has allowed the group to hear firsthand of the exciting work Dr Kwong and her research team have been doing in finding a biological control agent for invasive blackberry.

The project, funded by Meat and Livestock Australia and Agriculture Victoria, will investigate whether a caneboring sawfly (*Phylloecus faunus*), a natural enemy of blackberries in western Europe, will make a suitable biological control agent against invasive blackberries in Australia. In its native range, the cane-boring sawfly



larvae tunnel through blackberry primocanes (first-year canes), leading to cane collapse and dieback, and reducing daughter plant production.

Before the sawfly can be released, it must undergo a rigorous assessment process to show that the risk associated with its release into the Australian environment is very low or negligible. This will be done through a series of experiments known as "host specificity testing", designed to predict the sawfly's host range. During these tests, the sawfly will be exposed to native and economically important plant species that are closely related to the predominant weedy species, *Rubus anglocandicans* to see if it is able to feed and live on desired plant species.



Currently, the sawfly is being reared at the CSIRO European laboratories in France and will be imported into the AgriBio quarantine facilities in Melbourne later this year, where the host specificity testing studies will be conducted. Dr Kwong together with Simon Feillafe (Mitta to Murray Landcare Facilitator) will soon collect a number of blackberry plants from our area to use during the project.

Stay tuned for further updates on how the project progresses.

The *Bluearth program* continues to be a much loved part of the kindergarten program as the children learn to be more self-aware of both themselves and others, along with how to regulate their emotions if they are feeling overwhelmed.

The centre has also enjoyed participating in PJ week, decorating jeans as part of *Jeans for Genes* day and having crazy hair *for Cystic Fibrosis* awareness.

We have been successful with another *Woolworths Junior Landcare grant* which will see some additional wicking beds added to the outdoor area for more vegetable and herb production.
